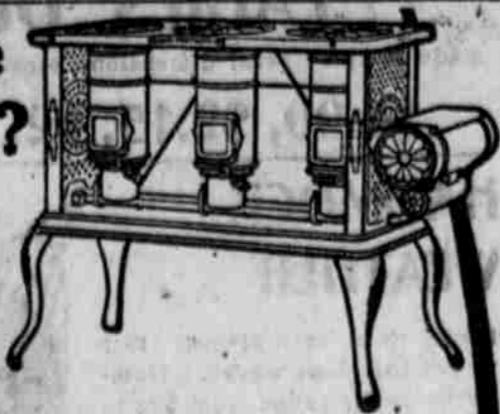


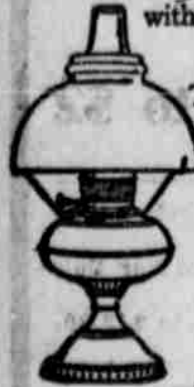

## DYNAMITE CLEVELAND STREET CAR

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Cleveland, O., June 11.—Determined efforts are being made by the detective bureau to learn the identity of the persons who dynamited a streetcar early today and thereby injured four passengers and the motorman and conductor.

The explosives were placed on Cedar avenue. Shortly after midnight the wheels of a car running on that line struck the dynamite and was blown from the tracks. Passengers were hurled from their seats and the floor was torn into pieces, but fortunately none of them were killed or fatally injured. Those who examined the car today are unable to understand how the few passengers escaped with their lives. The police are of the belief that the dynamite is an echo of the late streetcar strike.
