STAGE FRIGHT AMONG SENATORS

Seldom has a worse case of stage fright been witnessed in congress than that which marked the last four weeks of the session just closed. The leaders felt that they ought to adopt legislation on certain subjects as a preparation to "going before the country," but no sooner had they mapped out a certain line of action than they were scared out of it by a violent uprising against their proposals in some part of the country or from some influential class of citizens. Particularly was this true of the currency question. Every fresh plan that was worked out to meet objections in one quarter called down on the congressmen an avalanche of protest from other directions. If some genius could discover a line of legislation that would please everybody and therefore displease nobody, to be followed in those years when presidential and congressional elections are to occur he would win the eternal gratitude of "Uncle Joe" and his troubled lieutenants.

Meanwhile everybody out side of congress and a large number of those inside have ceased to pay any attention whatever to matters of legislation. Several weeks before adjournment the center of interest shifted to Chicago and Denver and the two great conventions. In another week Washington will resemble a country town on the day a big circus exhibits in the neighboring county seat. Politicians and newspaper men are already packing their grips for their departure to the Windy City. It is anticipated that

both conventions will be livelier than any that have taken place in the past 20 years, with the possible exception of the famous gathering at which Bryan leaped into sudden fame, and the newspapers are making preparations to cover them more fully than ever before. Fully four-fifths of all the correspondents in Washington have received instructions to attend both assemblages. What a presidential convention means to a newspaper and how it is thoroughly and promptly reported the press associations and great army of special correspondents is told in the current number of Appleton's magazine by a veteran newspaper man. It is estimated that the cost of reporting this year's party gatherings will be more than a quarter of a million dollars. That both conventions will be attended by an enormous number of spectators is shown by the fact that already there is a famine in tickets of admission and they are not to be had except by those who have a particularly strong pull with members of the committees.

Immediately this is known the rush will begin, and within a week the entire country will be flooded with tiny likenesses of the respective nominees.
