free today by the act of the new Re-
publican governor, Augustus E.
Wilson, who with a scratch of his
pen opened the prison doors before
Caleb Powers after an incarceration
of nearly nine years on the charge
of murdering a woman.

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SHOOTS ENTIRE FAMILY

AT MORNING MEAL

BECOMING DERANGED SUDDEN-
LY, MICHIGAN WOMAN ENDS
EXISTENCE OF HER FAMILY
WHILE EATING BREAKFAST.

Cadillac, Mich., June 13.—The
whole city was shocked this morning
by a tragedy that wiped out an en-
tire family when Mrs. Daniel Crop-
sey, becoming suddenly insane, kill-
ed her husband and six children and
then committed suicide.

FLORIDA AGAIN A TARGET

TEST A SUCCESS

MONITOR THOUGH PIERCED BY
BIG TORPEDO STILL FLOATS—
CREW AND OFFICIALS STAY
ON BOARD—TAFT PRESENT.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Norfolk, Va., June 13.—The moni-
tor Florida, which withstood the
bombardment of 13-inch guns two
weeks ago, was made the target of a
heavily charged Whitehead torpedo,
which pierced her double bottom
slightly after amidships today but
she still floats. Her crew, who re-
fused to leave at the former test, re-
mained on board again today and
are still on the ship. She is barely
out of commission and the damage is
not believed to be serious.

The attack of the Florida, how-
ever, was pronounced successful by
the experts and the target ship offi-
cially is "destroyed." Encouraged
by the example of the crew of the
Florida in the last test the naval of-
ficials, who are superintending the
test, also remained on ship. The
torpedo was fired from a distance of
300 feet. When it struck the bot-
tom of the monitor there was a great
shower of water and smoke and
steel. Only the specially constructed
bulkhead compartments, 12 feet
square, were opened by the torpedo,
which apparently exploded as soon
as it struck the armor plate.

The damaged compartments were
partly filled with coal and this prob-
ably lessened the effect of the explo-
sion. The steam apparatus of the
monitor was not impeded by the tor-
pedo. The test was considered a
great success and was observed with
greatest interest by Taft, Metcalf
and Meyer, the three cabinet officers,
and the members of the party, who
were on the scene.

In spite of the decision that the
torpedo was successful the crew of
the Florida are jubilant, still believe
the monitor is superior to the at-
tacks of modern destructive imple-
ments of warfare. They laughed
before the test today when asked if
they desired to leave the war vessel
and all agreed that they would stay
aboard until she went down.

BELIEVED TO BE

VICTIM OF THUGS

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, June 13.—An un-
known man believed to be John Hill
was picked up early today by police
men on the Barbary coast uncon-
scious and bleeding from injuries
that may prove fatal. The name
John Hill, found on the inside of his
coat is the only mark of identity that
was about his person. The police
believe that he was robbed and beaten
in some of the resorts in the
tenderloin and dragged out on the
street and left to die. He was badly
beaten up about the head, and his
pockets were rifled.

Fear More Quakes.

Baker City, Or., June 13.—People
living in this city and the territory
within a radius of 10 miles from
here are today fearing that a repeli-
tion of the two distinct earthquakes
shocks that rolled some of them out
of bed early Friday morning and
rattled dishes from shelves in the
store for them.

COAST DEFENSE PLANK

TO BE DEMANDED

PACIFIC STATES DELEGATIONS
WILL INSIST ON FORTIFICA-
TIONS AND SHIPS BEING PART
OF PLATFORM.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Chicago, June 13.—The Pacific
coast delegations to the Republican
convention will insist that a plank
be put in the platform, pledging the
party to increase the fortifications on
the Pacific coast and build a greater
navy.

Leaders of the party today were
notified of this demand and were given
time to understand that the subject is
uppermost in the minds of the peo-
ple of the Pacific coast states.

It is understood that in the rough-
ly drafted platform, the building of
more battleships was one of the sub-
jects suggested by President Roose-
velt. The matter was taken up at
the platform conference at the White
House last week. To what extent
the question of more fortifications
was discussed, however, is not
known. Certain members of the
platform committee who came from
the coast will force recognition of
the fortifications proposal and there
is much reason to believe that they
will succeed in having it included.

RICH GOAL LAND

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Washington, June 13.—After an
exhaustive investigation into the
minerals of the north Pacific coast,
the United States geological survey
has just issued a report showing the
existence of marvelous coal and pe-
troleum lands in the region of Con-
troller bay. It is expected that this
discovery will have a direct effort un-
on the coast of shipping on the Pacific
coast and in the case of future naval
operations in Pacific waters, coal
will not have to be brought half way
around the world for the use of war-
ships. Coal of a thickness of 30
feet was found in many places and
a large portion of it has the burning
properties of anthracite. Great quan-
tities of semi-bituminous coal were
also found, which under tests pro-
duced coke of excellent quality. This
is an important factor in view of the
project to build smelters in that re-
gion for the Alaska copper mines.
The fuel problems confronting the
north Pacific coast shipping and the
mining industry of Alaska, make
this discovery one of far reaching
importance.

District Attorney Removed.

Washington, June 13.—It was an-
nounced this afternoon that United
States District Attorney Norman M.
Ruick of Idaho has been removed
from office because he did not resign
when requested. General unfitness
is given as the cause for the action.

CLARK MAY BE LABOR CANDIDATE

FOR SECOND PLACE

PLANS TO MEET POSSIBILITY OF
MITCHELL RUNNING WITH
BRYAN—JOHNSON MAY NOT
BE BROUGHT UP.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Chicago, June 13.—A big sensa-
tion was sprung here today when
it was reported that E. E. Clark,
member of the interstate commerce
commission, who formerly was a
member of the Brotherhood of Rail-
road Conductors, has been chosen by
the Taft leaders as the candidate for
vice president. The decision it is
said was made for the purpose of
meeting the possibility that John
Mitchell will be Bryan's running
mate, and at the same time smooth-
ing out the old resentment said to
be held by some labor unions against
Taft for his strike decisions when
on the United States circuit court
bench.

BIG THINGS TO BE

DEMANDED BY LABOR

The executive council of the
American Federation of Labor was
in session here all day, but the pro-
ceedings were kept absolutely secret.
That the council discussed material
that they wish incorporated in the
Republican platform is admitted by
Samuel Gompers.

After the meeting Gompers stated
that in addition to a plank favoring
an anti-injunction law the council
would ask that the convention de-
clare in favor of amending the Sher-
man law, the direct election of
judges and the employment of idle
men on government works.

Hitchcock Wants Chair.

Many are convinced today that
Frank H. Hitchcock, the Taft man-
ager, is slated to be chairman of the
national Republican committee when
it is re-organized. Hitchcock says
he is not running for anything ex-
cept to nominate Taft.

Johnson May Give Up.

Omaha, Neb., June 13.—"Affairs
may shape themselves within the
next week or two that they will re-
sult in my name not being presented
to the Denver convention."

This statement was made by Gov-
ernor Johnson of Minnesota in reply
to a question as to whether he still
was a candidate for the Democratic
nomination for president.
