HOOD RIVER SAW MILL IS BURNED

LOSS IS \$70,000

MENOMINEE COMPANY LOSES ONE OF ITS LARGEST PLANTS BY FIRE—ATTEMPT TO STOP CONFLAGRATION FAILS.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Hood River, Or., June 13.—The Menominee sawmill, one of the largest plants of its kind in this part of the country, was burned to the ground today entailing a loss of \$70,000. The fire had gained such a strong headway before it was discovered that all hope of extinguishing it before it could destroy the mill was abandoned and the workmen, organized into a bucket brigade, began to protect surrounding property.

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WOMAN IS ARRESTED FOR MURDER

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Reno, Nev., June 13.—Mrs. Geo. Winters, mother of five children and well known here, is being held in jail today pending an investigation of a tragedy on the Reno-Sparks road last night in which Mrs. Winters shot and killed James A. Beatty, a well known merchant of Sparks and Reno.

Beatty and the woman were out for a buggy ride when the shooting occurred. The woman telephoned to the chief of police at Reno that she had shot a man and he went out to get the body. Investigation showed that Beatty had been shot in the back as his clothing was burned there and the bullet entered from that side.

Mrs. Winters admitted that she had done the shooting and said that she shot in self defense. She said that they had quarreled. The police are investigating her story, however, and will keep the woman in jail until the coroner's jury either releases her or she is indicted by the grand jury.

Mrs. Winters' husband accompanied her to the jail last night. He said today that he can give no explanation for the shooting.

STATE COLLECTS \$12,000 FROM EXPRESS COMPANIES

Under the new gross earnings tax the state has collected from the express companies about \$12,000 for the year 1907, according to the figures given out today by the state railroad commission. The companies pay 3 per cent on their gross earnings. This may appear small, but when it is considered what percentage this bears to the net earnings, the size of the tax looms up. Net earnings of these companies, the railroad commissioners say, are about 15 per cent of the gross earnings, so that the payment to the state is about one-fifth, or 20 per cent of the net earnings. The gross earnings of the Wells Fargo company alone last year from shipments exclusively within the state was \$721,962.89. The state has no jurisdiction over the interstate business of the companies in Oregon, and no tax can be levied on such business.
