Half a dozen boxes of the Kaiser seedling strawberries were brought in by the originator of the species, Russell Kelsler, from his place four miles north of town. Mrs. T. D. Jones has the thanks of the board of trade for a magnificent bouquet of roses, while another lady sent in a splendid specimen of Ulrich Brunners. A sample of orchard grass was left by some unknown parties, fully six feet fire inches high, and a specimen of mammoth oats six feet high with grain heads fourteen inches long was brought in by Mr. Radcliff of Morningside.
