

With impressive military ritual, the remains of J. Q. Barnes, late captain of the 73d Ohio regiment, and honored resident of this city, were laid to rest by the local post of the G. A. R. yesterday afternoon

at City View cemetery. At 2:30 p. m. the Grand Army veterans assembled at their hall and marched to the Barnes residence on Court street, where Rev. W. H. Sel-leck preached the eloquent funeral sermon. The charge of the ceremony was then turned over to the G. A The funeral procession proceeded to the cemetery, the members of the Grand Army and the Woman's Relief Corps marching to the Wil-lamette hotel, whence they were tak-en to City View in two special cars. At the grave the beautiful and impressive army ritual was performed. The bler, covered with the Stars and Stripes, was carried by veterans L. K. Page, T. C. Smith, A. W. Drager, Daniel Webster, G. P. Litchfield, and D. W. Mathews. At the conclusion of the ceremony the colors were dipped over the grave of the dead veteran, a member of the National Guard sounded taps, and the mili-tary band played "Nearer My God to Thee."

The solemn occasion brought home the fact anew to the old soldiers that time is unceasingly thinning the ranks the sword has spared, and that each year grows "Louder and louder the battle cry of heroes that camp on the unseen shore." Rev. Selleck's touching reference to this fact in his prayer and benediction brought tears to the eyes of many of the assembled veterans. At the end of the prayer the minister aptly paraphrased the scriptural in-juction, saying, "Well done, thou good and faithful soldier. Thou hast been faithful unto a few things: I will make thee ruler over many things."
