The first year we had 83 per cent fiction, the second year, 74 per cent fiction; last year 68 per cent fiction, and this year 60 per cent fiction.

We have made a gain in circulation of 6500 for the present year. Mrs. Cooke Jones resigned pending her removal from town, and Mrs. A. N. Bush was elected to fill out her unexpired term. The official term of trustees, Mrs. S. Monroe, Mrs. E. Gillingham and Mrs. Kellier expire at this meeting and on you devolves the election of their successors. Miss Mary Parmenter resigned as librarian January 8. Mrs. Ida L. Kidder, formerly employed as field secretary of Oregon Library Commission, was first employed as cataloguer and May 1, was appointed librarian.

Our catalog is not complete but is in working condition. Teachers' cards have been introduced in the grade schools whereby a teacher may take out as many as 25 books for the use of her grade and retain the same for six weeks. This should help the grade schools in the supplemental work. We are indebted to the ladies of the city for two very successful card parties whereby we secured the New International Encyclopedia and a complete set of Bancroft's histories pertaining to the Western United States. In this connection our thanks are especially due to Mrs. W. H. Eldridge, who rendered invaluable aid, and to Mrs. Cooke Patton who so kindly opened her house to the board.

We extend thanks to the city papers for their files and for space in their columns, also to the donors of about 20 periodicals and 447 books given during the present year. We are indebted to Mr. W. H. Phillips of the Fire Department for janitor work and much service. As a board we extend our thanks to the Salem Woman's club for its staunch support in our efforts. To the members of the board I am indebted for its very hearty co-operation.

Proposals invited for supplies for the Oregon state penitentiary for the period ending December 31, 1908. Sealed proposals for drugs, dry goods, groceries, butter, leather and findings, hardware, flour and meat, will be received at the office of the superintendent of the state penitentiary, until Friday, June 26th at 2 o'clock p. m., at which time they will be opened.

A deposit of \$200 in cash or certified check, payable to the superintendent, must accompany each bid for meat and flour, and all other bids must be accompanied by an amount equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the bid.

Samples to accompany all bids where practicable. The right is reserved to reject any and all bids and to accept or reject any portion of a bid. On each envelope should be inscribed the nature of the bid. Goods of Oregon manufacture or production will receive preference, other things being equal.

All goods and supplies must be delivered to the penitentiary within twenty (20) days after the contract is awarded. Schedules of the various lines of goods to be bid on will be furnished upon application to the superintendent.
