with shouts of "No! No!" from the southern delegates.

A movement was started this afternoon to have the credentials committee with one blow kill all the hopes of the allies by endorsing as a whole the temporary roll of the convention and making it permanent.

This was suggested as soon as the committee met and a resolution providing for the complete endorsement is being prepared while the anti-Taft men are making a great outcry. They say "steam roller" is a weak and insufficient word for use in describing the Taft machine, as it is now operating.

Senator Fulton, of Oregon, was elected temporary chairman of the credentials committee. Representative J. Sloat Fassett, of New York, was made temporary secretary. It is expected that they will be made permanent officers. Senator Fulton appointed a sub-committee, of which Dougherty, of Ohio, is chairman, to decide the rules and regulations under which the committee will proceed.

Stands by Courts.

While Senator Burrows was discussing the work of the department of justice, he interpolated a ringing declaration to the effect that the Republican party is not in sympathy with the spirit which would divest the courts of their constitutional power or impeach their judges. This statement evoked the loudest cheering of the day.

BRYAN IS ASKED TO WITHDRAW

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Richmond, Va., June 16.—George McDuffee Blake, a close personal friend of William J. Bryan, announced today that he had written to the Nebraskan asking him to aid in the nomination of Governor Johnson of Minnesota, as the Democratic presidential candidate.

Blake promised Bryan that he would receive the nomination by acclamation in 1912 if he would step aside now and permit the nomination of Johnson. He named former Governor W. L. Douglass of Massachusetts as Johnson's running mate and said:

"With this ticket—Johnson and Douglass—the Democrats would sweep the country."

The plea was made to Bryan that he agree to the suggestion for the good of the party. He has not received a reply from the Nebraskan.

DORN THREATENS HIS WIFE WITH A KNIFE

What came near to being a stabbing occurred last night at 7 o'clock in Westcott's stable on Ferry street, according to the story told Chief of Police Gibson by Mrs. John Dorn, who claimed that her husband, formerly of this city but now a saloonman of Woodburn, drew a knife from which she escaped only by jumping out of a window.

According to the story of Mrs. Dorn, she and her husband were on their way to Brettenbush springs and while in this city stopped in at Barnett's restaurant on Commercial street, where they had a slight row. Mrs. Dorn then left for the stable where she had some of her wraps, intending to go away from her husband. She was quickly followed by him, she states, and one word led to another and he finally lost his temper and drew a knife. Realizing the danger of her position, Mrs. Dorn ran quickly to a window in the back of the stable and escaped; then secured the assistance of the police for protection. She did not have her husband arrested, however, stating she would begin divorce proceedings immediately.

Plans for Eaton Hall.

Judging from the plans for Eaton hall, which were received yesterday, the new structure will be one of the handsomest college buildings in the state.

Willamette's new building will be four stories in height, and will have a frontage of 150 feet and a depth of 75 feet. It is to be built of pressed brick, and the general style of the architecture will be a modified Romanesque, having a massive colonnade central entrance and two smaller side entrances, with a tower rising a short distance above the eaves at each corner of the building.

The first floor will contain a large hall, the offices of the president, registrar and clerk, reception and wait-brary and four class rooms.

On the second floor will be the library and four class rooms.

The third floor will have a huge lecture room, a mechanical drawing room, museum and three class rooms.

It has not yet been decided what use will be made of the fourth, or attic story. This floor is as large and commodious as any of the others, and class rooms or laboratories can easily be installed there.

The plans for the interior of the basement have not been completed. Altogether the Eaton hall will be an ornament and a credit to the Capital City, and a building of which Willamette or any other university may well be proud.

Mr. Eaton, the donor of the \$50,000 structure received a telegram from his architect at Boise, Idaho, yesterday, who will be in Salem Thursday to witness the ceremony of breaking the ground for the building.
