## BUREN AND HAMILTON ARRESTED

Max O. Buren and C. S. Hamilton, members of the firm of Buren & Hamilton, and owners of the wooden building on Liberty streets, were demolished by the city council, were arrested at 4:30 o'clock yesterday by Chief of Police Gibson, for altering and changing the building in defiance of the city ordinance.

Chief Gibson last evening found a crew of men at work on the building, raising it to the street grade. As the chief had already been instructed two weeks ago to see that this structure as well as others was demolished within 60 days, he immediately swore out a warrant for the arrest of the owners and served it on the two furniture men.

The complaint, approved by the mayor, and signed by Gibson as private prosecutor, states that "Max O. Buren and C. S. Hamilton are accused in this complaint of the crime of changing and altering a wooden building within the fire limits of the city of Salem, and then and there being, did and there wrongfully and unlawfully change and alter a wooden building within the limits of the city of Salem, without and against the consent and permission of the common council of said city."

Buren & Hamilton at once retained C. L. McNary as their attorney. He telephoned to Recorder Moores and asked whether it would be necessary for his clients to appear in the police court. He was told that it would not, and this morning he went down to the city hall to talk the matter over with Moores. McNary said that he would proceed at once to get out an injunction restraining the city from interfering with the work of remodeling the former Celestial abode.

No date has been set for the hearing, because, as Moores said, the proceedings of the city court will have to come to a stop.

Attorney McNary, when seen this morning said, "The city is trying to confiscate private property, which they have no right to do. The building in question is not unsightly and it is in good repair. The council will not allow the owners to raise it or to repaint it, and we are going to test the validity of the ordinance."

Mr. Buren said: "We don't want to make any trouble, but we don't propose to let this thing pass. The joists and sills are in good condition."

McNary has the injunction papers nearly completed, and they will probably be filed this afternoon.

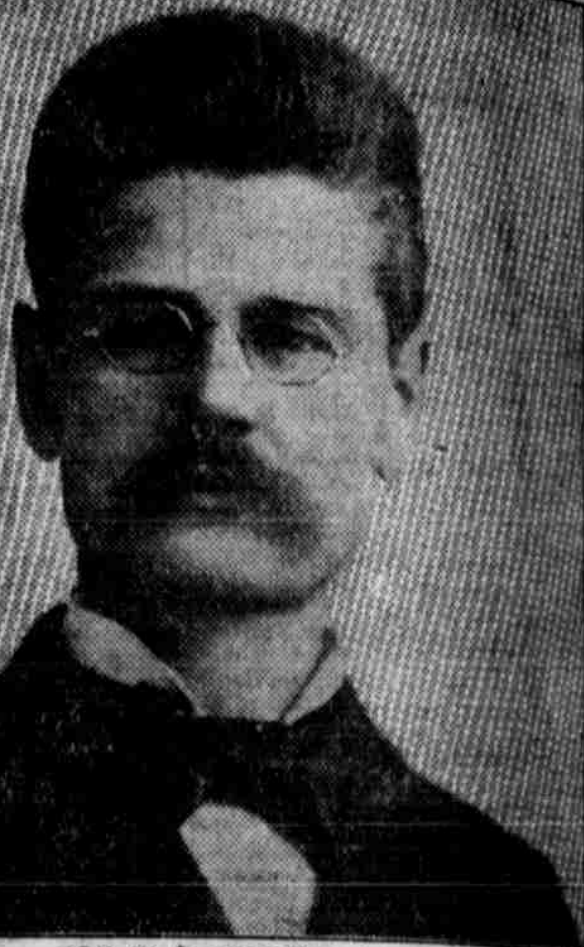
