### COUNTY.

The wool sales day in Vale was a complete success. Those who failed to store their wool where it could be reached by buyers from all parts of the country may lose considerable as a result. The wool sold well. About two-thirds of that stored at Vale was sold. The second wool sales day will be on June 23, when there will be about 1,000,000 lbs on hand for sale.

About 21 buyers were in Vale from Idaho and Oregon. Erbee Hayes, R. E. Baker, D. McLeod, M. B. Baker, John Sells, J. C. Gordon, Tom Venable, Frank McKnight, Looney Sheep Co., Thos. Parleish and Howard Bros. sold their clips, aggregating about 500,000 pounds. The price received ranges from 10 1/2 to 14 1/2 c. The highest price received at Caldwell was 12 1/2 c while Vale sales beat that 2c per pound. This is the highest price for which it has sold this year.

**Ten Dollars a Day.**

The value of education is not often expressed in dollars and cents, perhaps because it is so difficult to measure it with such an exact standard. To boys and girls who do not appreciate or understand in how many ways and to what extent a good education will benefit them, the dollar and cents measurement becomes very impressive, and it was for that reason that Mr. J. H. Hazen, assistant principal of a New York city high school, made the following remarks before an assembly of high school boys and girls:

"We are about to close another term of school work," said he; "to many of you this will mean, for one reason or another, the end of your school training; many of you—too many—are debating the question—Is it worth while to continue? Some of you find the work hard, some have had good positions offered you and some others will prefer to enter the world's work with such education as you now have. You are making a mistake. Better positions will be open to you with a diploma. Nothing that is good comes without hard work; many of those who leave school early have that to regret. But you will perhaps best understand what you are missing or losing by not staying with us when I tell you that some one has figured out that every day spent in high school has a money value. He has compared a large number of those who left school before graduating, with an equally large number of those who stayed to carry away a bit of sheepskin. His comparison of the money earning capacity brought out the startling fact that those who leave early really lose \$10 for every day they missed, or, to put it in another way, every day spent in high school is worth ten dollars. These are actual facts. Are you willing to work a little harder for ten dollars a day? Can you do better by going to work now, however tempting your position may be?"
