the action of the national committee by a single vote was opposed on the ground that it would appear to stifle a fair hearing of the cases. So the committee went over the 110 contests offered by counsel for Cannon, Fairbanks, Hughes and Foraker. The first vote on an Alabama contest was 35 to 7 in favor of Taft and showed how completely he was in control. The committee decided to submit a report to the convention recommending:

"That the temporary roll of delegates to the convention as prepared by the national committee be made permanent."

This makes certain that Taft will have over seven hundred votes on the first ballot.

A small minority threatened today to support Mayor Charles A. Bookwalter, of Indianapolis, in demanding that the contesting delegates from that city be seated. The Taft leaders asserted today, however, that such an effort would be subdued quickly and there is little prospect of any serious fight over seats on the floor of the convention.

Anti-Injunction Plank.
The labor plank, adopted by the executive council of the American Federation of Labor, was presented to a sub-committee of the committee on resolutions of the convention today. Labor asks that it be placed in the Republican platform. It was submitted by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation, in the following form:

"The Republican party is in accord with Lincoln when he declared 'labor is prior to and independent of capital; labor is the superior of capital and deserves more consideration.'"

"The Republican party has been a staunch defender of property and property rights, yet it holds that personal rights and human liberty and of necessity must be entitled to the first and highest consideration."

"Recognizing the new conditions arising from our marvelous industrial development, our people and the nation realize the fact that the wheels of commerce and industry require new law."

"New conceptions of law must be enacted to conform with modern industry and commerce and advance freedom in line therewith."

"We therefore pledge the Republican party to the enactment of laws by congress, guaranteeing to the wage earners, the agriculturists and the horticulturists of our country the right of organized effort, to the end that such associations or their members, shall not be regarded as illegal combinations in restraint of trade."

"We pledge ourselves to the enactment of a law to prohibit the issuance of injunctions in cases arising out of labor disputes, when such injunction be issued when there exists a remedy by the ordinary process of law."

"And which shall provide that in a proceeding for punishment for contempt of court, the party cited or contempt shall, when such contempt was not committed in the actual presence of the court, be entitled to trial by jury."

"We pledge the Republican party to the enactment of an amendment extending the existing eight-hour law to all government employees and to all workers, whether employed by contract, or by sub-contractors, doing work for, or in behalf of the federal government."

"We pledge the Republican party to the enactment of a law by congress, as far as federal jurisdiction can extend for a federal employees' liability act for injury to the body or loss of life suffered by employees."

Continuing the plank demands the following pledges:

A law to extend the federal jurisdiction to grant woman's suffrage.

To submit a constitutional amendment to the states for ratification providing for the absolute suffrage of women equal to that of men.

A law creating a department of labor separate from any existing department the secretary at its head holding a seat in the cabinet.

A law creating a federal bureau of mines and mining, preferably under the proposed department of labor.

A law appropriating sufficient funds for the investigation of the causes of all great disasters, for the purpose of recommending laws and regulations to prevent terrible loss of life in mines.

A law establishing United States government savings banks.

Samuel Gompers personally presented the labor resolutions to the sub-committee at the Coliseum annex and in a speech said that a revolution would be the result in this country if the labor unions are destroyed or if they are treated on the same plane as "criminal trusts" and monopolies.

"We don't want to eat the employer as an appetizer before breakfast nor as a desert after dinner, but we want to get fair treatment and are going to get it. We are not anarchists or destroyers of property. We don't represent that idea or that line of thought."

Allies Lose Out.
The report of the committee on credentials was made recommending that the temporary roll be made permanent.

It was adopted, thereby ending the battle of the allies.

The report on permanent organization next was received and adopted. General Stewart L. Woodford, of New York, and Governor Charles Dennen, of Illinois, were appointed a committee to escort Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, the permanent chairman to the platform.

Nothing for Coast.
There will be nothing doing for the Pacific coast in the resolutions adopted by the Republican convention.

Washington, Oregon and California will go on record through their members of the committee as opposing the President in the matter of the anti-injunction plank.

Through Richard A. Ballinger, of Washington, the coast is represented on the sub-committee of 13. Ballinger is a member of the Roosevelt tennis cabinet.

Since his arrival here Ballinger learned that the coast delegate would not hear to the anti-injunction plank, which it had been understood Ballinger would use his influence to get through in behalf of the President and labor.

Therefore Ballinger will be recorded in the discussions of the sub-committees opposing the anti-injunction plank and there will be nothing in the platform regarding the demands of the coast for increased fortifications and naval strength.

The subjects will be treated in a general way but there will be no special reference to the Pacific and its demands.

Washington's request for amendments to the interstate commerce laws so as to require a decision before an increased rate can go into effect when objected to, will be omitted.

It is a good guess that labor will be defeated in its demands and that the coast delegates will be the victors when the fight is over.

Proceedings Blocked.

The expected hitch over the anti-injunction plank blocked the procedure of the convention this afternoon. After a storm session, the sub-committee on resolutions took a recess until 3 o'clock. The members said the entire session had been taken up with the anti-injunction matter.

It is practically certain that the sub-committee will not be ready to report to the regular committee before 4 o'clock and that another adjournment without any business transacted will be necessary.

Fight Over Representation.

It was announced that the resolutions committee had rejected by a vote of 25 to 17 the resolution introduced by Representative Burke, of Pennsylvania, restricting the representation of the southern state. Burke announced that he would carry his fight to the floor of the convention. He said a minority report would be made, favoring the resolution.

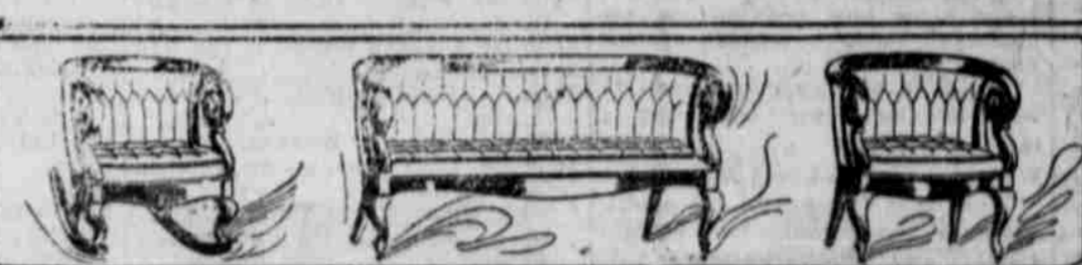
