THE EASTERN OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL.

Weston Normal school has scored a high-water mark this year—turning out 22 graduates with a large alumni reunion, splendid class day exercises and a grand program for commencement.

President French and his faculty have made a fine record with an enrollment of two hundred students and every available room packed full of students. The school has outgrown the town, has outgrown its equipment, and will need to extend its dining hall out of doors under a tent and erect more buildings to handle the classes.

Manual training has been made prominent at Weston, and is in line with the demands of the schools all over the state. We take pleasure in copying the following statement of the fine work done from the Weston Leader, and adding our endorsement of the high praise given Mr. Mather, a fine old-country mechanic in charge of that work.

"Of late years additions have been made to the plant of the Eastern Oregon State Normal school with a careful eye to their usefulness and value. The school now has a great deal to show to those who care at all for educational affairs. Perhaps the most interesting place of all is the room in the boys' dormitory devoted to the department of manual training conducted by Mr. John Mather. It is not a large room, yet several hours may be profitably spent therein by the observant visitor.

"Prominent educators who have visited the Normal have always been attracted by this room. The sloyd exhibit therein is said by those who ought to know to be second to none in the Northwest. The different joints alone, made by the boys from their own drawings, are remarkable specimens of amateur handicraft. Each boy has made a score or more of these from the variety of patterns offered. The girls make bread boards, Swedish mats and other articles of household utility. The fundamental principles of the joiner's craft are taught in a practical way by a fine old English gentleman who is past master in every detail of his profession.

"During his 30 years or more in the United States Mr. Mather has been connected with many leading institutions. He introduced Swedish sloyd at the Independence Centennial in Philadelphia in 1876, and has taught manual training at the Pennsylvania university, the Pennsylvania institution for deaf and dumb, the Scranton, Penn., Oral school, the Iowa State school for Mutes, the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society of California, the Institution for Care and Training of Feeble-minded and Epileptics of California, a similar school at Glenwood, Iowa, the Y. M. C. A. at Salt Lake City, the state Deaf and Dumb school of Iowa and the Weston Normal.

"Two fine educational exhibits of wood work made by Normal students have been framed, one of them showing joints in particularly artistic design. A handsome registration desk made entirely of Oregon wood, beautifully polished, was presented to the school by the boys in Mr. Mather's class.

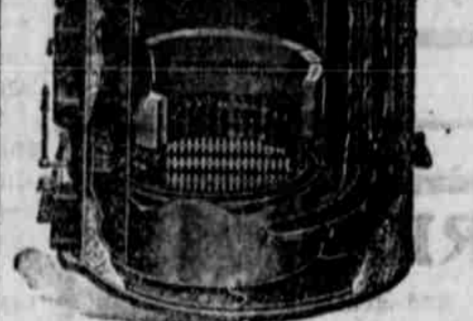
