POLICEMAN HEROICALLY SAVES SLEEPERS FROM FLAMES

San Francisco, June 17.—Police-men Michael Bain and Tom Conley saved 25 people from death in a lodging house fire early today, at the risk of their lives. A high wind was razing over the city and had not the policemen worked quickly and heroically everyone in the place would have burned to death.

When the two officers saw flames issuing from the burning building, they turned in an alarm and dashed up the burning stairs to awaken the lodgers. The blaze had smoldered for some time before the fire was discovered and many of the people in the place were nearly asphyxiated with smoke when the policemen arrived.

It was necessary to force many of the doors and dragged the dazed people to the windows before they were revived. When the lodgers found their exit to the street was cut off by flames, a panic ensued and the two policemen had hard work to save the lives of the crowd.

They broke in the door of a room leading out to a fire escape and nearly all climbed down in safety. The firemen put up ladders and saved several more people who had run to the roof of the building. Fireman Mike Hannon was badly burned while assisting in the work of rescue.

PORTLAND ARMED GUARDS SEARCH FOR ESCAPES

Portland, Or., June 17.—Prison guards, armed with rifles and aided by local police have made an unsuccessful all night search for their efforts to capture C. E. Farrell and Wilson, two prisoners who, after felling a guard with a slung shot, escaped late Tuesday from Kelly's Butte.

Farrell was serving a sentence for having stolen a piano and Wilson came from the municipal court for having assaulted Patrolman Goltz. One of the guards employed as a cook had left the door open between the dining room and the kitchen. Farrell, it is said, crept in upon the cook and felled him with a blow from a slung shot. How he got the weapon is a mystery. The men then fled.

DISCOVER ANOTHER "EMBALMED" BEEF CASE

San Francisco, June 17.—It became known today that the government inspectors at this port have foiled at attempt to work off a large quantity of inferior beef on Uncle Sam for use on the big supply ships Culgoa and Glacier that will take provisions for the Atlantic fleet on its trip around the world. The concern said to be implicated in the plot to get the best of the government have been docked in their shipments to the extent of 40,000 pounds.

The meat was not up to specifications, containing more waste than called for in the contract. The meat is being supplied by the Western Meat company, Miller & Lux, the Armour Packing company and other concerns here and costs the government seven cents a pound.

INVESTIGATE CHARGES AGAINST THE S. P.

San Francisco, June 17.—The federal grand jury today continued its probing into the alleged granting of preferential rates by the Southern Pacific to certain wool and lumber shippers.

The case of Miller & Lux, who it is claimed by Attorney H. B. Duncan of the interstate commerce commission, received rebates on their shipments of wool from points on the San Joaquin river to Stockton, was gone into at considerable length, the freight clerk at Stockton being the principal witness but little progress was made.

Concessions to Miller & Lux were made, the Southern Pacific maintain, to keep the business from going to the river boats.
