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TAFT IS NOMINATED ON FIRST BALLOT

WOMAN CUTS SLEEPING BABES' THROAT AND THEN HER OWN

NOMINATIONS ARE BEFORE CONVENTION

WOMEN NAMED FOR TAFT

SEVEN ARE NAMED FOR PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATION—TAFT, CANNON, FAIRBANKS, KNOX, HUGHES, FORAKER AND LA FOLLETTE.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Coliseum, Chicago, June 18.—Secretary Taft was nominated by Theodore Burton, of Ohio. Speaker Cannon was nominated by Henry S. Boutell, of Illinois. Vice President Charles W. Fairbanks was nominated by Governor J. Frank Hanly of Indiana.

Governor Charles E. Hughes, of New York, was nominated by General Stewart L. Woodford, of New York. Senator Philander C. Knox, of Pennsylvania, was nominated by Lieutenant Governor Robert S. Murphy, of Pennsylvania. Senator J. B. Foraker, was nominated by C. B. McCoy, of Ohio. Senator La Follette was nominated by Cochems, of Wisconsin. After the platform had been adopted and the minority report defeated, Chairman Henry Cabot Lodge announced that the time had arrived for the nomination of presidential candidates.

Cannon Named.
The roll of state was called and when Illinois was reached Representative Henry A. Boutelle was recognized. He began his speech nominating Joseph G. Cannon. At his reference to the speaker, there was tremendous applause, which increased when he spoke of Roosevelt. The Roosevelt demonstration, however, died down within one minute. At the mention of Cannon's name the galleries let loose in the wildest cheering of the day so far. The Illinois delegation leaped on their chairs yelling "Uncle Joe! Uncle Joe!"

REPUBLICAN PLATFORM IS SUBMITTED TO CONVENTION

Contains Anti-Injunction Plank---Tariff Revision, Currency Law, Railroad Legislation, Postal Saving Banks and Anti-Trust Laws

Coliseum, Chicago, June 18.—The resolutions committee today reported the platform to the convention, soon after it convened. The platform as submitted follows:

"Once more the Republican party in convention assembled, submits its cause to the people.
"This great historic organization, that destroyed slavery, preserved the union, restored credit, expanded the national domain, established a sound financial system, developed our industries and resources, and gave the American nation a seat of honor in the councils of the world, now meets the new problems of government with the same courage and capacity, with which it solved the old."
"In this, the greatest era of American advancement, the Republican party has reached its highest service under the leadership of President Roosevelt.

"In no other period, since national sovereignty was won under Washington, or preserved under Lincoln, has such mighty progress been made by the American nation.
"The highest aspirations of the American people have found voice in the Republican party. Conscience and courage in public station have reached higher standards and the right and wrong of private life have become national principles of its political faith.
"Capital and labor have been brought into closer relations; the abuse of wealth and all the evils of privilege and favoritism have been put to scorn by virtue of justice and fair play.

"The great accomplishments of President Roosevelt have been, first and foremost, his brave and impartial enforcement of the laws; his prosecution of illegal trusts and monopolies; the exposure and punishment of evil-doers in public service; more effective regulation of the rates and service of the great transportation lines; the complete overthrow of preferences; the arbitration of labor disputes; the amelioration of the conditions of the workers of the country; conservation of our national resources and a forward step in the improvement of our inland water ways.
"We declare our unflinching adherence to the policies thus inaugurated and pledge our party to their continuance under a Republican administration of government.
"Under the guidance of Republican principles the American people have become the richest nation in the world. The United States now have one-fourth of the world's wealth. It makes one-third of the modern manufactured products, yet the great natural wealth of the country has been scarcely touched.

"Notwithstanding the indefensible filibustering of the Democratic minority in the house of representatives, during the last session of congress, many wholesome and progressive laws were enacted.
"We especially commend the passage of the emergency currency bill; the appointment of a national monetary commission; the employers' government liability laws; the measures looking to a greater efficiency of the American army and navy; the

widow's pension bill; child labor laws for the District of Columbia; the new statutes providing for the safety of railroad engineers and firemen and many other acts, conserving the public welfare.

Tariff Revision.
"The Republican party declares unequivocally for the revision of the tariff by a special session of congress immediately following the inauguration of the next president and commends the steps already taken toward this end.
"We favor the establishment of maximum and minimum rates, to be administered by the president under the limitations of a fixed law; the maximum rates to be available to meet discriminations by foreign countries against American goods entering their markets; the minimum rates to represent the formal measure of protection for some industries. The aim and purpose of the Republican party will be not only to preserve without excessive duties that security against foreign competition to which American manufacturers, farmers and producers are entitled, but also to maintain a high standard of living for the wage earner here and in the Philippines. To that end we believe in the free exchange of products with such limitations as to sugar and tobacco as will afford adequate protection to domestic interests.

Currency Measures.
"We approve the emergency measures adopted by congress during the recent financial disturbance and especially commend the passage of the law designed to protect the country from a repetition of money stringency. The Republican party is committed to the development of a permanent currency system, responding to our greater needs. The appointment of a national monetary commission by the present congress after impartially investigating all proposed methods, insures the early realization of this purpose. The present currency laws have fully justified their adoption but the expanding of commerce, the marvelous growth of wealth and population, the multiplication of centers of distribution, the increasing demand for the movement of crops in the west and south, entailing periodical changes in monetary conditions, discloses the need of a more elastic and adaptable system of currency. Such a system must be automatic in its operation, minimizing fluctuations in interests and rates and above all, must be in harmony with the Republican doctrine, which insists that every dollar must be based upon value as good as gold.

Postal Savings Banks.
"We favor the establishment of postal savings banks as a system for the convenience of the people and the encouragement of thrift.
Anti-Trust Law.
"The Republican party passed the Sherman anti-trust law over Democratic opposition and enforced it after Democratic dereliction. It has been a wholesome instrument for good in the hands of a wise and fearless administration. But experience has shown that its effectiveness can

OUTBURST WHEN TAFT IS NAMED

Coliseum, Chicago, June 18.—The demonstration for Taft today was different from the demonstration that attended the mention of the name of Roosevelt yesterday, but it was led mainly by the delegates and the galleries much of the time were impassive. The Ohio delegation began singing "Glory, Glory Hallelujah" and the delegations from the other states joined.
There was great cheering and yelling among the regular Taft boomers stationed in the gallery at the rear but they did not have much effect upon their neighbors.

Late Bulletin.
Taft was nominated on the first ballot, which resulted as follows: Taft, 703; La Follette, 25; Foraker, 18; Cannon, 61; Fairbanks, 40; Knox, 8; Hughes, 6; Roosevelt, 3; total, 979.
5:25 p. m.—Nomination of Taft made unanimous. Convention adjourned until 10 a. m. tomorrow.

THINK JAP BOAT IS SMUGGLER

San Francisco, June 18.—It was learned here today that agents of the United States government have been dispatched secretly to Gaviota, a lonely landing place on the coast near Santa Barbara to await the arrival of the British steamer Pinna, under charter by the Japanese line; Toyo Kisen Kaisha, from Yokohama to carry oil.
It is understood among revenue officers who permit themselves to whisper of the case, that a cable from the special agent of the government at Yokohama saying that the steamer has contraband opium and silk and several Japanese coolies aboard, is the reason for the action of the government, and a revenue cutter will be sent to Gaviota to await developments.
The Pinna is chartered to carry oil. It was reported when she last landed at the lonely port that several Japanese without papers had been put ashore. Just why the liner should clear from Gaviota is a mystery and the collector of the port at Los Angeles will be asked why permission was given the Japanese boat to clear from there.

KILLS HER CHILDREN AND SELF

IN WEST VIRGINIA

TRAGEDY ENACTED IN LONELY SPOT—TOTS LIVES' END AS THEY SLUMBER—COMMITTS SUICIDE IN CHAIR.

Parrsburg, W. Va., June 18.—A terrible tragedy was enacted near here today when Mrs. A. L. Stairs of Sandy Creek, cut the throats of her two children and then slashed her own throat.

The woman lived in a small home on the outskirts of the town. She had cut the children's throats while they slept and both little bodies were found in bed with their throats cut from ear to ear. One child was six months old and the other was two years old.

The woman then sat in a chair and deliberately drew the knife across her own throat, falling to the floor dead.

ene lamp in the "manor house." John Cole, a relative of the Harris family, was in the room at the time of the explosion and was badly burned.

The colony was founded by Harris who came out here from England and attracted a large following. Lawrence Oliphant, a distinguished English diplomat and writer, was a member of the colony at one time. Later his cousin wrote a novel making bitter charges against Harris.

Tahiti, June 18.—Ariipaea Salmon, or "Prince" Salmon, who cut a wide swath while in San Francisco some time ago on his way to Honolulu to claim ex-Queen Liliuokalani for his bride, has dropped completely out of sight and not even his most intimate friends know his whereabouts. Through inquiries concerning him it has become known that Salmon has no claim to the title of prince and was just a common Tuamotu islander. "Prince" Salmon's visit to San Francisco proved his undoing. Liliuokalani had given her consent to the wedding but when tales of her fiancée's escapades in California reached here the "Prince" came into disfavor, even in his home island.
