UNITE FARMERS' TELEPHONES.

The conference called by Wm. Goodrich of Chemawa at Salem next Saturday is a very important one.

There are now hundreds of farmers' lines connected with the Salem switchboard, and there should be more.

If the trustees and directors will get together and adopt lines of cooperative work and submit them to the Pacific Telephone Co., they will get favorable consideration.

There is no good reason why all the farmers lines in the valley should not be united in the Salem office and be open and FREE TO ALL SUBSCRIBERS AT SALEM.

Mr. Goodrich deserves credit for enterprise in working up the idea of uniting all these interests for the public benefit.

THE DEPOT CAR SERVICE.

The city council should secure to the people a regular electric car service to the Southern Pacific passenger depot.

That station is not centrally located and with trains arriving at all hours of the night, A CAR SERVICE IS VERY IMPORTANT.

If there is no service but the regular Yew Park carline, there will be many trains that will not be furnished with electric car facilities.

The deep creek that runs between the Yew Park line and the station is a serious obstacle to passengers taking the Yew Park line.

There will always be DANGER OF PERSONS FALLING INTO THAT CREEK in trying to get over and catch cars at night.

If the Yew Park line is used to the station a fine wide bridge should be put in there, and railings provided so that people will not walk off.

Then there should be an electric car to meet every train, NO MATTER AT WHAT HOUR OF THE DAY OR NIGHT IT ARRIVES.

The station is inconveniently located for the traveling public. It will be a hardship on our city to withdraw what little accommodation there is now for the traveling public.

MAKE SALEM A SCHOOL CENTER

stated. It should be charged up to the shortcomings of lumbermen, dealers in hardware, real estate men, bankers, commercial organizations and industrial associations.

The press of the country occasionally prints an article setting forth the advantages which builders may derive, but no systematic campaign for the enlightenment of the people who are in a position to build ever has been launched.

THE TIME TO BUILD. This country is suffering, if at all, with suppressed enthusiasm. The warehouses are full; stocks of lumber, building hardware, lime cement and all other classes of building material are more than sufficient to supply the present demands.

It is true in every line of industry in the United States and each particular department of trade is waiting for SOMETHING TO START.

NOW IS THE TIME TO START IT. The reason has been stated and may be reiterated.

Material and labor can be secured on more advantageous terms now than at any other time within the last five years, and probably more cheaply than will be possible at any time after 1908.

Mills and factories are being operated under reduced schedule. Some of them are closed down entirely. The workmen who manned these institutions are idle; some of them are walking the streets looking for employment.

Lumber now is being offered at prices which appear ridiculously low when compared with market values last year.

This year a great deal of lumber has been sold at prices that did not yield sufficient to cover the actual cost of producing the stock.

Yellow pine, hemlock, spruce, northern pine and hardwoods in all sections of the country now are being offered at prices ranging from \$2 to \$10 below last year's schedules.

Prices of millwork are on approximately the same footing. Other kinds of building material also are being offered at bargain prices.

In some sections of the country building has been good but as a whole it is far from satisfactory.

Its sluggishness may be traced largely to the ignorance of the people who are able to build and who do not appreciate or do not know of present advantages.

Sooner the railroads and other heavy consumers must come into the market and the instant they do prices are going to advance 10 to 25 per cent, and the individual who delayed building in the hope of securing even better terms is going to be left.

Dealers in building material, lumber organizations, commercial associations, banks and others who are interested in having the people at work, doing something for themselves and adding to the physical properties of the nation, should cooperate in presenting this question to the people of the country through the medium of the daily press, periodicals of all classes and trade publications, acquainting the people
