PLAY AT THE GRAND LAST NIGHT

Nell Gwynne was the opening bill of the Georgia Harper company which began its four-nights' engagement in this city at the Grand last evening.

The play was well produced, and the acting throughout was good. Miss Harper in the role of Nell Gwynne far outshone all the other lights of the company, although Joseph Detrick as Charles the Second, gave a very creditable performance. The minor parts were also well sustained by the several actors.

"Nell Gwynne" is one of the best plays of its kind, and contains some excellent situations, which for the most part were very well handled. The great climax in the third act, and the action leading up to it, is an excellent example of dramatic construction, and imposes upon the actress the difficult task of portraying a mixture of comedy and vital seriousness.

In this situation Nell dons the robe of Sir Francis Jeffreys, and in the guise of the Chief Justice secures the information which saves the life of her benefactor. The scene, while it is of the most serious nature contains comedy elements which must be portrayed. In this Miss Harper succeeded remarkably well. At the end of the act the disguise is discovered, but Nell escapes to her carriage with the papers, and looking out of the window at her dumbfounded enemies, says very calmly, "Gentlemen, gentlemen, to hell with you all."
