All goods must be in strict accordance with sample in original packages when possible, and delivered at the State Insane Asylum within 20 days after the contract is awarded, and bids must be on blank forms, which will be furnished together with the instructions to bidders, by the Clerk upon application. Each bid on flour or meat must be accompanied by a certified check of \$200, and each bid on fish by a certified check of \$75.00, and all other bids by certified checks equal to 10 per cent of the amount bid; checks of

unsuccessful bidders to be returned immediately, and those of accepted bidders when the contract is completed. Bid must be enclosed in sealed envelopes and directed to the Board, care of the Clerk, and plainly marked, "Bids for Asylum Supplies," and the class of goods bid on should also be inscribed on the envelope. Price, fitness and quality being equal, preference will be given to articles manufactured, grown or produced in this state. When a particular article is specifically called for, bids on other kind, manufacture or brand equally good will be entertained, but to insure recognition of such bids, samples of the articles it is proposed to supply must accompany them.
