BARNETT DEFENDS HIMSELF

San Francisco, June 19.—Walter J. Barnett, accused with wrecking of the California Safe Deposit & Trust company, took the stand in his own behalf this afternoon. He testified that he had never taken the Colton securities. He said that J. Daisell Brown, former manager of the bank, who is now serving a term in state's prison and who is the chief witness for the state against Barnett, was in control of the affairs of the bank all the time. Barnett stated that he had brought the Colton securities to this city from New York upon the order of Brown who was manager of the bank. He simply acted as the attorney for the bank, he said, and had nothing to do with the direction of its affairs. When Barnett took the stand, there was a stir in the court room and Judge Conley had to rap for order several times. While Barnett was on the stand, he glared at Brown, who's testimony is relied upon to send him to jail. Brown declared on the witness stand the other day that that he considered Barnett a dirty dog and Barnett has stated that he has a similar opinion of the state's star witness.

Rawhide Banks Closed.

Rawhide, Nev., June 19.—Owing to the closing of the Bank of Rawhide the business situation here is serious today, as the city is now without a financial institution. Transactions requiring the use of the bank will have to be held up indefinitely and thousands of dollars may be lost as a result. The other two banks of Rawhide closed their doors ten days ago. The director of the Bank of Rawhide says that the closing of the bank is a precautionary measure.

Searchers for the body of Warren Cole, a boy drowned in the Stanislaus river in California, have hit upon the novel idea of floating his clothes down the river to find the direction the body took. His companion's body has been recovered through this way.

Editor Bethel, who through his paper in Korea, has been inciting the Koreans to rebellion, has been sentenced to three weeks imprisonment and a fine of \$500 by the British consul.

ENJOINS CHIEF OF POLICE

(United Press L. & W. Wire.) Portland, Or., June 19.—Objecting to the attempt of Chief Gritzmacher to make him a common policeman and dress him in a blue uniform, Detective Joe Day today secured an injunction in the circuit court restraining the chief from enforcing his order. He insists that he shall do the work of a detective and dress in plain clothes, incidentally drawing an extra \$15 per month more than the salary of a patrolman. The injunction issued is temporary but an effort will be made later on to make it permanent. When that is done the matter will be heard on its merits. Unless Gritzmacher is restrained, says the complaint, Day will be reduced to the ranks and irreparable damage and injury will be done.

MILLIONS FOR FORT MASON DOCK

(United Press L. & W. Wire.) San Francisco, June 19.—Official advices received here today from Washington state that the contract for the construction of three immense government transport docks near Fort Mason has been let to T. J. Carlin, a New York contractor. The bid was \$1,197,000. The three docks will be begun at once. The contractor is expected here Monday to look over the ground. The docks are to be 1500 feet long and two sea walls 1000 feet long are included in the contract.

Colonel Hamilton Young, of Washington, in charge of the newspaper business of the Western Union at the Republican convention in Chicago, died there today at the home of his son from heart trouble. Colonel Young was one of the oldest and best known telegraph operators in the country.

COMMISS HOLDS RATES TOO HIGH

(United Press L. & W. Wire.) Washington, June 19.—The Interstate commerce commission today decided that in a great measure the rates charged by various transcontinental lines from the Pacific coast and south on timber, manufactured lumber, shingles, etc., were unreasonable and excessive. The claims of northwestern lumber men that a general advance of from 20 to 25 per cent in rates by the railroads, November, 1907, to practically all eastern points, was excessive, is supported in part by the commission. The commission orders in part the restoration of the lower rates in effect prior to October, 1907, approximately 50 per cent of the increases being condemned. This will result in a reduction of about 5 per cent per hundred pounds in the rates now effective.

The commission decides that rates should be lower in the Potlatch case involving the differential rates on lumber from the Snake district. In the case of the Western Oregon Manufacturing association against the Southern Pacific and others the advance of from \$3.10 to \$5 per ton on rough lumber from points in the Willamette valley to San Francisco is condemned. The commission refuses to establish a route from Washington points to Colorado destinations and the east, holding a satisfactory route already exists.

Mrs. C. M. Dummek, of Los Angeles, has sued her husband, a wealthy business man, on a warrant charging him with failure to provide for herself and daughter. She states he has been hypnotized by his business partner.

Six companies of militia are on their way from Pacific Grove, California, to be distributed through Alaska.

The case against Wm. J. Barnett, the California banker accused of embezzlement, will probably go to the jury today.
