**Here Are a Few Facts.**  
Plans for the celebration of the Fourth of July are well matured and about three thousand dollars will be expended in honor of the ancient declaration of Independence. There will be twenty thousand people in the city on that day.  
The three-day Cherry Fair will be celebrated a week later and Salem will convince all the other towns in

the valley that this is indeed the Cherry City of the Pacific coast. About \$1000 in cups and prizes will be given for the best exhibits and the ladies will conduct a flower show in addition.

The United States National bank, that started as the Salem State bank a few years ago, has plans complete for a four-story steel building, and such demand for offices that all are practically taken in advance of striking a blow on the new structure.

The Salem Cannery is running on strawberries with a force of over 100 women and girls. There is a constant stream of farmer's wagon unloading at the door.

G. D. Bannister of Rosedale has made a great success of the Pride of Cumberland strawberry. It has a fine shape, good color and read clear through.

Salem is rapidly becoming the convention city of Oregon. It has a fine opera house and larger gatherings meet at the state capitol building. The city hall has a fine armory hall, but a larger general convention hall is much needed.

As the owners of the principal hotel will allow no improvements to be made nor make any themselves Salem is badly in need of a modern hotel, with baths, comfortable suites and up-to-date grill room. It would bring much travel to this city.

Salem is spending \$150,000 on about twenty blocks of bitulithic paving and will have the finest, widest and most expensive paved streets of any city in the Northwest.  
Ellis and Wood, real estate men, have located five new families from the east in the last 30 days.

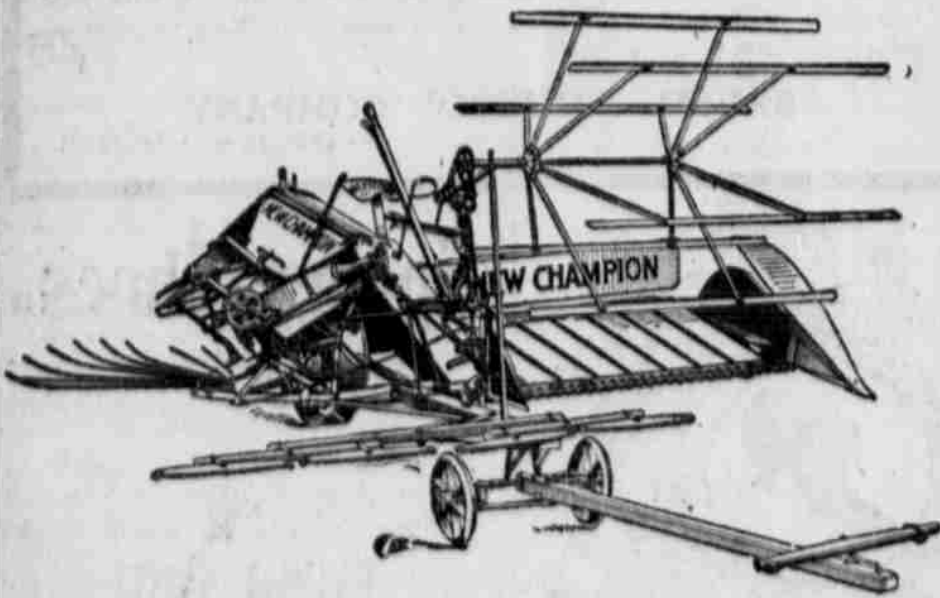
