St. Petersburg, June 22.—Czar Nicholas today promulgated one of the most sweeping measures ever issued in Russia, by which all women students are ordered expelled from Russian universities. \$12,000 IN GEMS

GEMS LYING LOOSE IN SHOPS AT ROSSLAND, B. C., EASY BOOTY FOR THIEVES—NO CLUES TO ROBBERS.

No reason is given for the act, and the subject is exciting interest among the blue stockings of the bay region. The young people became engaged when Rev. Maxwell was attending Harvard university some years ago.

AUTOISTS HAVE A NARROW ESCAPE

Waite of Portland, and Miss Reita Pemberton of Tacoma, are congratulating each other today and are receiving the congratulations of their friends on their narrow escape from death or injury when a big automobile in which they were riding plunged to the Kalama river, carrying them into the chilly water.

The party started from Portland Sunday afternoon for a drive to Tacoma. While they were riding across a bridge over the Kalama river, some distance from the city, Robertson, who was in charge of the car, stepped on the running board to examine a chain, leave Waite in charge of the steering apparatus. He lost control of the machine, and a moment later the party found itself struggling in the shallow water. The car was recovered in good shape and Robertson ran his guests to the nearest railroad station where they boarded a train. Robertson proceeded to Tacoma in his car.

CLAIM TO HAVE FOUND BURIED CITY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Berkeley, Cal., June 22.—Prof. Joseph L. Voyal and his fellow enthusiasts of the Psychological Research society, who claim to have discovered another buried city by means of a divining rods are today making preparations to excavate the spot. Attended by nearly 100 recruits to his Psychological research society, many of whom were well known society women, Prof. Voyal started out over the hills back of the University of California yesterday on his second expedition in search of buried cities. With the aid of psychic compasses, divining rods and other instruments, the enthusiastic explorers decided that a large pile of rocks on the side of a hill was the scene of the second forgotten city and returned to Berkeley jubilant in their fiend.

U.S. TROOPS ARE AT WAR IN MEXICO

WITH YAQUI INDIANS

FEAR MASSACRE OF AMERICANS—YANKEE AND MEXICAN SOLDIERS PREPARE TO QUELL REVOLUTIONARY SPIRIT.

(United Press Leased Wire.) City of Mexico, June 22.—Fearing a massacre of Americans by Yaqui Indians in the northern state of Mexico, United States and Mexican troops today are waging vigorous warfare to crush forever the murderous tribe. If a battle at Buena Vista in the state of Chihuahua, the Indians resisted so desperately that 20 were killed and many wounded before they were put to flight. The townspeople aided the soldiers, even the women taking a hand in the fray. The war department has prepared a campaign of extermination, believing this to be the only effective means of putting an end to the depredations of the unruly Indians. The Yaquis, by some mysterious means, have spread among the tribes the news of the government's intention and are banding together for one last stand; meanwhile pillaging towns and murdering people. American troops are patrolling the Mexican side of the Rio Grande, with permission of President Diaz to avert the massacre which it is feared is impending.

SUICIDE BELIEVED TO BE PENNSYLVANIA GRAFTER

(United Press Leased Wire.) Port Townsend, Wash., June 22.—Information that has reached the officials here lead to the belief that the body of the dead man found here two weeks ago, partially identified as J. G. Brain, was that of a suicide growing out of exposures in the state capital graft cases in Pennsylvania recently. Identity was wholly obscured beyond a tailor's clothing mark and a part of a letter head carrying the name of a Philadelphia architectural decorating firm. In a letter signed "John," a Chicago man has sent to Chief of Police Barelay a photograph that may be a picture of the dead man, and should identification be established, news of the suicide will be provided.

It has been determined that the dead man was an architect and that he had been a resident of Philadelphia within the past year. The body was found in a cluster of shrubbery near the city park. From the clothing \$15 was taken, and near by a scrap of paper was found with the penciled words "May God forgive me." He was supposed to have been en route from San Francisco to Treadwell, Alaska, as a strike breaker.

ADVISE OPEN PORT FOR YOKOHAMA

(United Press Leased Wire.) Yokohama, June 22.—Dr. Tajiri, formerly the vice minister of finance of Japan, in a public speech today urged that Yokohama must become a free port like Hamburg, so that Japan will receive the benefit of increased commerce by way of the Panama canal.

The suggestion met with much favor and probably will be adopted, if complications standing in the way can be overcome. Dr. Tajiri said that Japan should be ready to meet the increase in commerce, which will follow the opening of the canal and should let no barrier stand in the way of the development and maritime trade.

Will Help Old Tar.

San Francisco, June 22.—A number of the old time friends of Captain Richard W. Nye, who has been arrested on the charge of selling \$500 worth of machinery from the schooner Gayhead on which he was watchman, will probably come to the rescue of the unfortunate captain today. Captain Nye was for more than 30 years a prominent navigator on this coast but has recently been acting as watchman for the Pacific Coast Whaling & Steamship company.

BENSON AND DIMOND ARE VINDICATED

AT WASHINGTON D.C.

JURY OUT SINCE FRIDAY—CASE ON FOUR YEARS—GUILTY ONES WILL BE PUNISHED ON ALL COUNTS.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, June 22.—After having been out since Friday noon, the jury in the Hyde-Benson land fraud cases this afternoon returned a verdict of guilty against Frederick A. Hyde and Joost H. Schneider on all counts and not guilty in the cases of Henry A. Dimond and John A. Benson on all counts. It has taken more than four years to reach the conclusion of the case. The first indictments were returned against the four men February 7, 1904, but the trials did not actually begin until last April. The men were charged with conspiracy to defraud the government out of valuable timber lands by use of the "dummy entry" system of enrolling fictitious names. Dimond was an attorney for Benson and was held not to have had any guilty knowledge of the transaction. Benson made his defense on the ground that he did not purposely do anything fraudulent in connection with making entries. The jury returned its verdict at 3:40 o'clock. The members were polled as to every count in the indictment with respect to Hyde and answered guilty every time. The first count charges unlawful conspiracy and the other counts charge conspiracy to defraud the government of the United States.

ROOSEVELT AS HARD A PLAYER AS HE IS WORKER

(United Press Leased Wire.) Oyster Bay, L. I., June 22.—President Roosevelt went into his summer schedule today and took up his play with almost as much vigor as he has given his work recently in Washington. The town people are full of renewed life since the arrival of the Roosevelt at Sagamore hill. The President was up early and appeared in a light summer suit. He went for a ride about the place and arranged for tennis games and trips on the Sound.

Secretary Taft is expected to arrive next week and he will be the first important visitor of the summer. It is not announced how long Taft will remain but it is expected that he and the President will make formal plans for the coming campaign.

SAN FRANCISCO SNAILS

TICKLE FRENCH PALATES (United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, June 22.—It's a far cry from San Francisco to Paris, yet it became known here today that in the back yard of a home here snails are being raised to tickle the palates of Parisian gourmets. Mrs. Caroline Rixford is the pioneer of this new industry. So far none of the snails have been sacrificed on local gastronomic altars.

CHINESE AMBASSADOR'S WIFE DISAPPOINTS FRISCO CHINESE

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, June 22.—The local Chinese colony is disappointed today because of the sudden departure of Mrs. Wu Ting Fang, wife of the Chinese minister to the United States and her son. The two were to have been the guests of honor at a big banquet tonight and were to have been especially honored by a reception in Chinatown tomorrow, but Mrs. Wu suddenly discovered that she had lost a day crossing the Pacific ocean, she found that she had to hurry on to Washington to be in time for the celebration of her husband's birthday. To have been late on that occasion would have been a disgrace according to the tenets of her people.

BANKER GIVEN A ROASTING

BY PROSECUTOR

SAN FRANCISCO BANK WRECKER MADE TARGET FOR CUTTING SPEECH—CASE GOES TO JURY TOMORROW.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, June 22.—Coward, cur, thief and liar were the epithets applied to Walter J. Barnett, accused with wrecking of the California Safe Deposit & Trust company, by Assistant District Attorney Cook in one of the harshest invectives ever hurled against a man at the bar today. Cook went at length into the evidence that had been introduced in the case and frequently pointing his finger at the defendants he shouted his scolding in the very teeth of Barnett, who sat impassive and unmoved through it all. Cook asked for a conviction of the first count in the indictment on which Barnett is being tried, that of stealing \$31,700 as special administrator of the estate of the late Eileen M. Colton. "That man Barnett," cried Cook, pointing at the accused man, "is guilty of the worst kind of breach of faith. He has proved false to the trust put in him by the dead. He is guilty of a breach of the laws of the state, and gentlemen, upon your verdict, depends the final confidence of this city."

Cook declared that he was no defender of J. Dalsell Brown, Brown, Barnett and Treadwell, he said, are responsible for the wrecking of the bank. Brown is serving a term in prison. The prosecutor said that Barnett brought the Colton securities here from New York for the express purpose of hypothecating them to help out the shaken bank. The defense will speak this afternoon and the case will probably go to the jury tomorrow.

UNABLE TO LAND GIRL IS SHIP'S GUEST

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, June 22.—After having been a continuous passenger on the steamship Princess Royal for four days, Miss Sylvia Edwards, pretty and about 20, last evening completed her involuntary voyage. She got on the boat last Wednesday in Victoria, B. C., and since that afternoon had been enjoying the triangular run to the discomfort of the C. P. railroad officials.

The United States immigration officers refused to let her land in the United States and the Canadian immigration officials were equally insistent on demanding that she keep out of Canada.

Young Miss Edwards went to Victoria from this side of the line on the understanding that she was a native of Canada. In the British Columbia capital, however, the police looked on her with suspicion. She told them she came from Portland, and on this information Dr. Milne, Canadian immigration agent, ordered her deportation.

The United States immigration officials at Victoria protested against the woman being sent to Seattle, but the Canadian immigration men were obdurate. It took just four days to secure the necessary information at Portland to establish the fact that the young woman was of American birth, and during all that time she enjoyed the best that the steamship afforded.

BIG FINE FOR TRUST COMBINE

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, June 22.—Federal Judge Hough today fined 24 manufacturers of the paper trust \$2000 each on pleas of guilty to the charge of violating the Sherman anti-trust law. Twenty-three members of the alleged combination were indicted by the federal grand jury last week and another pleaded guilty without being indicted.
