Ten Mile residents are alarmed over a series of robberies that are being perpetrated there and will appeal to Prosecuting Attorney L. A. Liljeqvist to put an end to the reign of petty crime. Unless the matter ends soon it is feared that there will be serious developments.

Boats, guns, ammunition, stock, household goods, etc. have disappeared from a dozen or so homes at Ten Mile within a short time, and the residents believe that it is the work of a gang. It is believed that a clue has been obtained to the guilty parties and this will be submitted to Mr. Liljeqvist and Marshal J. W. Carter.

Saturday night the home of Chas. Norris was pilfered. A night or so previous O. Hibbard's home was robbed. Peter Manegat has lost several dozen chickens and other farmers have lost calves, etc.

A vigilance committee may be organized by the residents.

All goods must be in strict accordance with sample in original packages when possible, and delivered at the State Insane Asylum within 20 days after the contract is awarded, and bids must be on blank forms, which will be furnished, together with the instructions to bidders, by the Clerk upon application. Each bid on flour or meat must be accompanied by a certified check of \$300, and each bid on fish by a certified check of \$75.00, and all other bids by certified checks equal to 10 per cent of the amount bid; checks of

unsuccessful bidders to be returned immediately and those of accepted bidders when the contract is completed. Bid must be enclosed in sealed envelopes and directed to the Board, care of the Clerk, and plainly marked, "Bids for Asylum Supplies," and the class of goods bid on should also be inscribed on the envelope. Price, fitness and quality being equal, preference will be given to articles manufactured, grown or produced in this state. When a particular article is specifically called for, bids on other kind, manufacture or brand equally good will be entertained, but to insure recognition of such bids, samples of the articles it is proposed to supply must accompany them.

The Board reserves the right to reject any or all bids, or to accept or reject any part of a bid. Bids will be opened at the Capitol at Salem, at 10 a. m. Monday, June 29th, 1908.

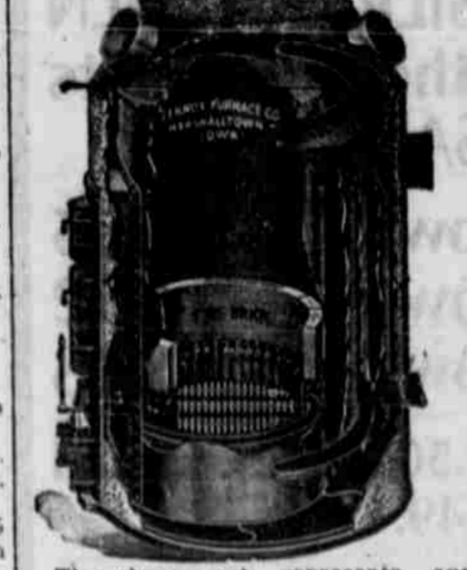
