**Two Men Arrested—** A fight on State street Saturday, which grew out of an argument between John O'Meara and W. B. Lovel, resulted in the arrest of the two men. They were taken to the city jail by Chief Gibson, where they will tarry for the next few days.

**Set Aside Property—** Judge Scott Saturday issued orders setting aside the exempt property in the estate of J. E. Hammond, deceased, for the use of the widow, and authorized G. W. Hubbs, the administrator, to pay \$30 per month to Mrs. Hammond, also to sell the library and certain fixtures left by Mr. Hubbs.

farmers last Saturday was attended by Dr. Withycomb of the Oregon Agricultural College, and Fruit Inspector Armstrong. Both men spoke at the meeting, and advised the farmers of that section to go into the fruit raising and dairy business.

**Farmers Complain—** Farmers and fruit men complain bitterly at the delay in repairing the big bridge. The crew laid off yesterday, and the ferry can take but two teams at a time. Large strings of teams are waiting for the ferry. The contractor should be required to put on two crews, and let traffic through as soon as possible.

**Electric Rate Cases—** Judge Galloway held court this afternoon and issued an order continuing the present rate on the Portland General Electric to Oak Grove and Milwaukie, pending an appeal to the supreme court.

**Bound Over—** The case of the state vs. Blanchard charged with assaulting a young woman, was heard before Justice Webster, and as the young woman's testimony sustained the charge, he was bound over to the grand jury.

## ATTORNEY GENERAL PASSES ON NEW LAW

Attorney General Crawford had received a letter from J. M. Dalton of Burns, newly elected treasurer of Harney county, inquiring as to the date when the county treasurer elected at the last general election shall assume the duties of his office under the constitutional amendment voted on the same election. The letter was written after read-

ing a newspaper article which contended that as the newly elected officer could not show that he was elected prior to the adoption of the constitutional amendment, he could not take his seat until January 1.

Attorney General Crawford gives as his opinion that the office of county treasurer does not come under the head of those offices affected by the amendment, and that Dalton should assume the duties of his office in July.

## DEATH OF MRS. JOHN HOLMAN.

Mrs. Jennie Weeks Holman of this city died after severe and protracted suffering at her home, 434 High st., Sunday afternoon at 1:30, aged 67 years, surrounded by her husband and children and grand-children. She was one of the pioneers and best known women of this city, having come here in 1867, two years after her husband located here, coming from Ontario. She was born in London, England, March, 1841, was married to John B. Holman at London, Ontario, July 3, 1861, where two children were born, one Walter J. who resides in San Francisco. At Salem two daughters were born, Mrs. Victoria Lunn, and Mrs. Geo. Meyer. She was a devout member of the Episcopal church all her life. The funeral service will be held Wednesday at 3 p. m. at the family residence, but the interment will be private.

A sketch of her life and character will appear later.

## BIG GUNS BOOM ON PUGET SOUND

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, June 22.—The annual practice with the mortar guns at Forts Worden, Casey and Flagler, protecting the entrance to Puget Sound, is being held today. Tomorrow the coast artillery companies at the three big sound forts will spend the day in shooting the big disappearing rifles. The entire work will be given over to the annual field exercises. Eight Seattle officers of the national guard will spend a week with the regulars in their camps and witness the work of the soldiers.

## FEAR SAILOR VICTIM OF FOUL PLAY

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, June 22.—The police are today trying to find the robber who killed James W. Tracey, a coal passer on the U. S. Connecticut and threw the body off the highest point of Telegraph hill. The position of the sailor's body and the fracture on the skull indicates that he was probably killed for his month's pay, which he had with him, and then thrown off the cliff.

## MANY KILLED IN LOUISIANA TRAIN WRECK

(United Press Leased Wire.) Baton Rouge, La., June 22.—Several are reported killed and many injured today in a wreck on the Baton Rouge Eastern railroad. State Representative Jones is said to be among the dead. Several state senators and representatives were injured. Specific details are lacking.
