THE RECONSTRUCTION OF THE UNIVERSITY.

Now that the election is over, and the State university has got its permanent support of \$125,000 a year something should be done FOR THE RECONSTRUCTION OF THE INSTITUTION.

But in all the jubilation and in all this week of graduating exercises it is not likely that any earnest effort will be made to correct any of the defects in that institution.

The Linn county grange has started a movement to have both the State university and the Agricultural college PUT UNDER ONE BOARD OF REGENTS, as the four normal schools have been.

There is room to doubt if that alone would accomplish the real ends to be sought. It might result in greater economy and in cutting out the duplication of courses.

What excuse is there for carrying on the SAME COURSES OF STUDY AT TWO INSTITUTIONS MAINTAINED BY THE STATE? It will be said there must of necessity be some duplication of courses.

There will have to be some duplication in sciences and in English, but what excuse is there to carry on department in civil engineering, mining engineering, hydraulic engineering, and electrical engineering?

THERE IS TOO MUCH ENGINEERING AT THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, according to the list of graduates published, where first took a course in agriculture, 11 in domestic science, and about sixty-odd in engineering.

But the industrial and domestic science departments of the agricultural college have been strengthened and enlarged, and A LOT OF THE LITERARY AND CULTURAL COURSES HAVE BEEN CUT OUT.

The Agricultural college is putting in wood and metal-working shops, cookery and dress-making departments, and enlarging the old work and getting out of competition with the State university.

and there is room for improvement in both institutions in getting out of each other's fields. The people will not stand to be taxed to maintain duplicate courses.

In closing the critical discussion, The Capital Journal wishes to suggest in the interest of the university that it meet the demands of the people better NOW THAT IT HAS MORE MONEY TO CARRY OUT ITS PLANS WITH.

The law and medical departments should be taken out of the purview of Portland, the standards of admission raised to that of other first-class universities, AND MAINTAINED AT EUGENE.

The department of education should be built up and made to serve the rapidly growing demand for special teachers for the high schools. All the students taking professional courses SHOULD BE REQUIRED TO PAY TUITION.

The feelings of a large number of people in Oregon are set forth by the following editorial from the Portland Labor Press, and the real friends of the university should try to understand the situation:

"Portland's work, which saved the university bill, is now called 'noble' by the university boosters. The ungarbled truth is that the 'friends of the university' grossly misrepresented facts in saying the opposition to the appropriation was not representative. The purely superficial work done in Portland is all that saved the measure. The university's home county went against it. The state at large outside of Portland defeated it by a round majority. With the normal vote of Portland it would have been beaten. The superficial effort put forth in this city after the university people found it would take strenuous work, and none too scrupulous, is all that saved the bill. The Labor Press is not particularly sorry the measure passed. The sum of money may not be too great. But the Labor Press knew that it knew the feelings of the people of Oregon, or of such of them as exercised their feelings independently, and events have clearly proven that it did."

Complain to Commission.

A. B. Sprague of the Crossett Timber company of Elgin has written a letter to the Railroad commission complaining of the inadequate baggage facilities afforded by the O. R. & N. company between Elgin and La Grande. The letter states that there are two trains daily between the cities. The evening train, which carries most of the passengers, has no baggage car, and refuses to carry baggage even as freight. The passengers, Mr. Sprague states, are compelled to hire teams to transport their trunks and satchel cases from Elgin to La Grande or else have their baggage arrive 24 hours behind time. He asks the commission to look into the matter. As yet no date has been set for the hearing.

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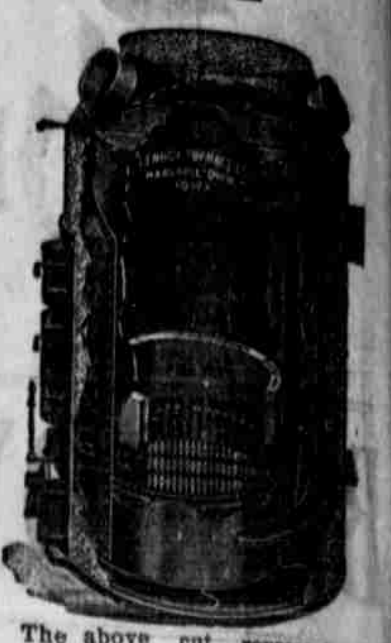
