Advertising for Recruits. The Navy Department has completed the arrangement for the next fiscal year's advertising on account of navy recruiting. This has been by accepting the bid of a New York advertising firm which has made a study, by the aid of statistics, of the methods by which men now in the service were attracted to the navy It was found, surprising to everyone, that the want advertisements in the daily newspapers yielded the best results, and that the highest percentage of available men was obtained from these inconspicuous offers to labor. It was observed that these want advertisements are consulted not only by those who are out of work, but by those who want to better their condition, and that less than 50 per cent who came to the navy in this way were really unemployed, and recognized the service as an institupects. Taking this view of the sitnation, it has been decided that the bulk of the funds for advertising for naval recruits shall be used in this way, although there will be also an employment of the billboard display advertising, and, to a less extent, of the other forms of publicity.
