### LATE CYCLING NEWS

**The Annual F. A. M. Meet.**  
New York, June 22.—July 1, 2, 3 and 4. There are the dates of the most important motorcycle event of the year, and the name of the city New York, which will be every motorcyclist's Mecca pro tem. Headquarters will be established at Broadway and 63d street, which as is initiated know, is right in the heart of the benzine blocks, where bicycles and their big brothers fall to the merry, merry, from dawn to way past early candle-lighting time. And here is the program:

Wednesday, July 1, 8 a. m., runs Grant's tomb, Lafayette Boulevard to Fort George Hill. 12 m., sight-seeing tour in "rubberneck" coaches, out of town guests only. 2 p. m., run around Central Park. 4 p. m., run to Hall of Fame and Vauxlandt Park. 8 p. m., excursion to Coney Island.

Thursday, 8 a. m., bath run to Key Island, via cycle paths; or exhibition of life saving. 10 a. m., run to Roslyn, L. I., via Jericho Road. 3 p. m., tilting tournament at Roslyn. 8 p. m., "smoke" and general jinkstide at Roslyn.

Friday, 7 a. m., start of 50 miles omnium test from Roslyn. 1 p. m., powder party and annual photograph at Sea Cliff, L. I. 7:30 p. m., annual F. A. M. business meeting and election in Terrace Garden hall, Y.

Saturday, July 4, 10:30 a. m., trophy excursion to Paterson, N. J. 2 p. m., national championship race meet at Paterson, stadium.

**F. A. M. Meet Racing Events.**  
Although the circumstances which attend the F. A. M. 1908 Meet club look for an outside the city track are accented with much reluctance, it is already evident that in choosing the new Paterson N. J. Stadium, a track will be utilized that is doubtless without a peer in America for motorcycle racing. It will be the first scientifically banked track for motorcycle racing since the destruction of the Charles River track in Boston, on which the mile record of 56 2-5 seconds was made in 1905. That record stands today, and as the Stadium has been constructed to sustain a speed of a mile in 50 seconds, there is much interest in the possibility of the making of a new record. The Charles River track was banked 45 degrees, while the Stadium banking is 47 1/2 degrees.

The events which will be decided at the F. A. M. meet on the afternoon of July 4th will be as follows: Two miles novice, 30% piston displacement; five miles, private owners; one mile, national championship; three miles, amateur, open; 10% piston displacement; three miles, private owners, 30% piston displacement; five miles national championship; ten miles, professional, prizes \$30, \$20, \$10, with entry fees added; ten miles national championship; five miles, amateur, open; ten miles handicap, the 61 cu. in. piston displacement limitation will apply except as noted above.

There will be three or more prizes in each event, among them the \$75 Paterson Stadium cup. The entry fee will be \$1 for all amateur events, and \$2 for the professional races.

For the championship medals from the official F. A. M. die will have their initial presentation. These medals will be in gold, silver, and bronze. Entries will close June 25, with Roland Douglas, 317 West st., New York.

**British after Canada Cycle Trade.**  
British cycle manufacturers are already looking with jealous eyes at the renewed interest in cycling which is being taken up in Canada with the same enthusiasm that is now being displayed on this side of the international boundary line. The Toronto News announces that the managers of two of the best known English bicycle factories, one located in Coventry and the other in Birmingham, have decided to establish a joint concern in Canada, to be located near Toronto. The new factory will manufacture bicycles and a line of cycle accessories. In addition a Nottingham, England, cycle factory will establish a large selling agency in Toronto, but for the present will not undertake to manufacture bicycles on this side of the water. This proposed English competition does not please the Canadians who are interested in this industry. However, one Toronto dealer, when informed of the English project, said that it would be impossible for the British makers to make much headway, as their bicycles are heavy and clumsy affairs, with steel rims and hand brakes, while the Canadian product embodies the wooden rim and coaster brake, not to mention the cushion fender.

**Detroit's Woman Motorcyclists.**  
Mrs. H. G. Smith, of Detroit, wife of the president of the Detroit Motorcycle club, is said to be the only motorcyclist in the middle states. Last summer she spent many happy hours with her husband on a motorcycle built for two, and this year she decided to have an individual mount. Her machine has a 3 1/2 horse power engine, and is capable of making a mile in a minute. Mrs. Smith recently accompanied the Detroit Motorcycle club on its run to Cass Lake, on which occasion she showed herself to be an expert driver, and was up with the leaders all the way.

**Bicycle Riding an Instinct.**  
Former riders of the bicycle, who feel the old enthusiasm for the wheel stirring in their bosoms, but who are wondering whether they could master the cycle again, will be interested in the state ment recently made by a French scientist. He maintains that after a very limited experience in bicycle riding a person retains the wheel in an upright position by a sort of instinct. No matter how long it has been since a person has given up riding, the trick will come back to one as soon as he gets on a wheel again.

**Bicycles Have the Right of Way.**  
The recent decision of Judge Lueders, of Cincinnati, in a personal injury case, will be read with interest by cyclists and automobile drivers alike, as the precedent established promises to be far reaching. The case was one in which an automobile ran down a girl who was on a bicycle, and the judge held that a bicycle rider has prior right to the streets over an auto or a horse-driven vehicle. The judge's decision was based on the fact that cycling is nearer pedestrianism than any of the other forms of locomotion named and therefore it should have a greater right on the highway.

**Humane Inspectors on Bicycles.**  
Indianapolis has mounted her two humane officers on bicycles. One of them, Inspector Shine, was a bicycle officer in the police department for a number of years, and it was on account of the ability that he displayed while on that duty that he was promoted to be a humane inspector with the rank of sergeant. Heretofore the humane inspectors have depended upon the street cars.

**Two Cycling Meets for Baltimore.**  
Two cycling events, of more than local importance, are being framed up for the Pimlico track, at Baltimore. The first of these will be a motorcycle event for which a F. A. M. sanction has been granted for July 4. In this event the chief feature will be a five mile handicap and a one mile open race. While the proposed meet will come on the last day of the annual F. A. M. gathering to be held in New York, it is confidently believed that many of the southern motorcyclists, who will be unable to be in that city, will join with the rapidly growing legion of Baltimore and Washington riders, in making the Pimlico meet a great success.

Application has been made to the Federation of American Motorcyclists, for sanctions for a joint meeting, for canations for a joint meet, to be held at the Pimlico track on Labor Day. A request has been made to have some of the F. A. M. championships scheduled for this date, and if the promoters are able to secure this privilege, it will add immensely to the interest in the meet. Among the bicycling events to be on this Labor Day card, special attention will be given to the novice class.

**New Tracks Discussed.**  
The announcement made last week, that a new National Circuit for bicycle racing is now certain, is regarded by the sporting writers of this country as the most important bit of cycling news that has been published in several years. The fact is conceded that the instant success of the new Newark Velodrome was the foundation upon which the National Circuit idea was built. It is also responsible for a violent eruption of new track projects—or perhaps they are only dreams. Several professional riders, who would have no trouble in finding financial backing if they decided to take the plunge are considering the feasibility of building modern tracks at Brooklyn and Bridgeport. Both cities are favorably situated to draw large crowds from their own and adjoining populations.

**Baltimore Track Project Hange Fire.**  
At this writing there seems to be much doubt as to whether Baltimore will have a new, modern bicycle track, such as was projected recently by Jack Prince. It was the hope of this well-known track builder that arrangements could be made for Sunday racing but that is one thing Baltimore will not stand for. However, as a Baltimore man who is prominent in cycling circles says: "Every night is a holiday in Baltimore," and there is still a possibility of a new track being built, mainly with a view to racing under the electric lights. The chief hitch in this program lies in the fact that certain parties holding franchise rights are alleged to be indisposed to take any action on their own behalf, or to waive their rights and allow others to go ahead. As Baltimore is one of the very best cycling cities in the east, it is to be hoped that amicable arrangements will soon be made, in order that the city's sport-loving public may have an early opportunity to enjoy the rejuvenated bicycle racing game.

F. A. McFarland, who is the oldest bicycle rider on the track today, is making the youngsters at Salt Lake City sit up and take notice. McFarland started on the National Circuit in California in 1895, and has followed the game ever since. He has pulled down over \$100,000 in purses, and has ridden all over the world.
