DISCOVER OIL NEAR ASTORIA

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Portland, Or., June 24—A good flow of natural gas has been discovered on Grays bay opposite Astoria. For the past year a company has been at work on a prospect well there as there were surface indications of oil in that vicinity. Now it is reported that at a depth of 300 feet a good flow of natural gas has been encountered. Experienced drillers are at work on the hole. The drill has struck a shale stratum which is said to contain first-class oil indications and the management of the company express confidence that petroleum in paying quantity will be found before the hole goes much deeper. OHIO SYNOD OF LUTHERAN CHURCH

Portland, June 23.—The sessions continue very interesting. A paper prepared by Rev. G. Pauchert of Spokane, Wash., on the advisability of appointing a mission superintendent to supervise this phase of church work, occupied the attention of the synod, and caused some discussion. The synodical sermon last night was preached by Rev. F. Granson of Farrington, Wash. He emphasized the foundation, structure and expansion of the New Testament era. Next Sunday morning Rev. G. Koehler of Davenport, Wash., will preach. The educational interests of the church will be presented next Sunday evening by Dr. Carl Asherman of Pacific seminary at Olympia, Wash.
