The physicians who have steadfastly denied that the case was serious now admit that it was hopeless a month ago. The patient lost 150 pounds in the last two months.

The announcement of the death was made by Dr. Joseph D. Bryant by telephone to New York, where it was made public before it was known here.

The official statement signed by Drs. Bryant, Geo. B. Lockwood and J. D. Carnochan says the direct cause of the death was:

"Heart failure brought on by pulmonary thrombosis and oedema." The announcement of the death of former President Grover Cleveland at his home here this morning was a great shock to this quiet little university town, which had been encouraged to believe it's most prominent citizen was progressing well.

Since his return to his home here from Lakewood the reports continually have been favorable though they have been somewhat mysterious.

Mrs. Cleveland has been very cheerful and has called on her

friends from time to time. She apparently up to yesterday had no idea that her husband was near death.

The doctors have come and gone with regularity and no one about the city caught a glimpse of the former president after he entered his doorway on his return here.

Reports that he was suffering from cancer of the stomach were constantly denied and it was said that his illness was an affection of the digestive organs which would not give him much serious trouble. The only explanation of the constant attention of the physicians was that he was a heavy man and at his age any illness might be serious.

The general belief prevails that neither Mrs. Cleveland nor the children were informed by the doctors of the real nature of the disease, which as yet has not been made known officially but which is believed to have been cancer.

The Cleveland children are at the family home of the family at Tamworth, New Hampshire, where they are in the care of their maternal grandmother, Mrs. Perrine.

The news of the death was not made public until two hours after it had actually occurred. At the time Cleveland was dying the reports from the residence said he was improving.

ways optimistic and continually gave out statements to the effect that he was improving. She denied that there was any cause for concern.

Guards were kept about the hotel, however, and no one was admitted. The only entrance in use was far away from the Cleveland apartment and the former president was as completely isolated as if he had been on a ship at sea.

Suspicion that his condition was serious was increased by the fact that two physicians came alternately from New York, each spending 24 hours with the patient. All prescriptions were taken to New York to be filled apparently for fear a local druggist might tell what medicine was being used and thereby indicate the seriousness of the case.

This state of affairs continued until two weeks ago and every now and then there was a report that he was dying and it always was indignantly denied.

When it was announced that he was well enough to return to his home, John Hays Hammond appeared at the Lakewood hotel with his big touring car and Cleveland was placed in it and taken across country to a small station where a train

for Princeton was met. This was done for the purpose of hiding the fact of his departure, but merely to make a shorter journey.

Upon his arrival at Princeton, Cleveland went immediately to his home.

Princeton, N. J., June 24.—Former President Grover Cleveland died at 8:40 o'clock this morning, succumbing to the illness from which he suffered all winter. He recently returned here from Lakewood, N. J., where he was confined for a long time in the Lakewood hotel. It was said when he returned that he had recovered his health.

1865—Defeated for district attorneyship Erie county.  
1866-70—Practiced law.

1870—Elected sheriff of Erie county.

1881—Elected mayor of Buffalo.

1882—Elected governor of New York, plurality 200,000.

1884—Elected President of the United States.

1886—June 2, married Frances Folsom in the White House.

1888—Defeated for re-election as President and engaged in law practice in New York.

1892—Elected President of the United States.

1895—Settled Venezuela boundary dispute.

1896—Established home in Princeton, N. J.

1905—Elected trustee Equitable Life Insurance society, with majority of stock.

1907—Chairman of Association of Life Insurance presidents.

1908—Became ill while at Lakewood, N. J.

1908—Died 8:40 a. m., June 24, at his home in Princeton, N. J.

Lakewood, N. J., June 24.—The news of the death of former President Grover Cleveland was a great shock here, where his remarkable confinement in the Lakewood hotel was the subject of the keenest interest all spring.

Deepest mystery surrounded the illness of the former president. He came there in March, while the season was on at the Lakewood hotel. There were many guests in the hotel.

A tremendous sensation was caused when Nathan Straus of New York, a close friend of Cleveland and owner of the hotel, gave arbitrary orders that it be closed at once.

All the guests left except the Clevelands, who were occupying an apartment on the second floor at the end of the long wings. The hotel management denied that the season was cut short in order that Cleveland might not be disturbed, but all evidence pointed to that conclusion.

It was given out that the former president was only slightly indisposed and was suffering from stomach troubles. This was not generally believed on account of the great mystery that was thrown about his confinement in the hotel.
