**LATHROP RELEASED ON BONDS**

P. N. Lathrop, the co-respondent in the divorce suit of Savage vs. Savage, who is charged with committing perjury in his testimony in the trial, and was arrested yesterday afternoon in Grants Pass by Sheriff W. P. Russell, of Josephine county, is today at Liberty under bonds of \$500 furnished by Hal Patton. As soon as the warrant was issued for the arrest of Lathrop Sheriff Culver notified the sheriffs in the several counties of the fact, and when Lathrop was taken into custody in the southern town Russell at once wired the sheriff's office in this city.

Culver telegraphed to H. J. Workman at Grants Pass, who left immediately with Lathrop for Salem. The prisoner was met at the depot by Sheriff Culver at 5:30 o'clock this morning and brought to the sheriff's office, where he remained until his bond was furnished by Hal Patton. Judge Webster fixed the bond at \$500, which was accepted by police Judge Moores, and Lathrop was then released.

The preliminary hearing in the case was set by Judge Webster for next Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock. Lathrop has expressed his intention to waive examination at that time and take the case before the grand jury for first hearing.

The penalty for the crime with which Lathrop is charged is imprisonment in the penitentiary of from three to ten years.

David H. La Follette was born near Crawfordsville, Indiana in 1824. In 1849 he came to California, removing to Oregon in 1860. Until eight years ago Mr. La Follette lived in Marion county. He then moved to McMinnville, where he resided until his death last Monday. In 1843 David La Follette married Cynthia Rallsback. Six children were born, all but one of whom are living. David La Follette was the father of Alexander M. La Follette of Salem, and the uncle of Senator Robert M. La Follette of Wisconsin.
