## FUNERAL TRIBUTE TO MRS. JOHN HOLMAN

The last earthly remains of a highly esteemed pioneer woman were laid at rest Wednesday afternoon upon the arrival of the 3 o'clock train. The funeral of the late Mrs. Jennie Weeks Holman, wife of John Holman esquire, manager of the Albany Iron Works, and well known iron-master of this city, was held from her late residence, on High street, in this city, and the body was given private interment at City View cemetery. There was a large attendance of the friends of the departed, who was a great favorite socially and had many warm friends. All of her family living were present, and the Episcopal burial service was read by Rev. Barr G. Lee of St. Paul's church in a most impressive manner. The music was by a quartet consisting of Messrs. Wenger and Ketchum, Mrs. Hinges and Miss Cornelius, who sang beautifully "Lead, Kindly Light," and Mrs. Hinges sang most impressively "One Sweetly Solemn Thought," and at the grave a special favorite of the departed, "Only Remembered." The bearers of the pall were Dr. E. A. Pierce of Portland, Hon. P. H. D'Arcy, Hon. J. H. Albert, Hon. Squire Farrar, Geo. G. Bingham and Russell Catlin. Among friends from abroad present at the funeral were her daughter, Mrs. Vic Lunn, and her son, Walter J. Holman, of San Francisco, Dr. and Mrs. E. A. Pierce and Mrs. Slater of Portland, Hon. and Mrs. E. M. Miller of Albany, and a steam launch of the employes of the Albany Iron Works, which shut down in respect for the departed. Six grandchildren were present—Alice V. and Fred R. Meyer of Salem, Thos. and Helena Holman and Geo. S. and Jas. H. Lunn of San Francisco. The home of the deceased was filled with gifts of flowers, many of them sent by friends at Portland and Frisco. Mrs. Holman was one of those sweet women whom everybody loved, a character noted for her nobility and loving acts of kindness to all with whom she came in contact. The unkind word never passed her lips. She suffered patiently her great afflictions and in all her sickness never murmured but showed Christian patience and resignation for all that came of tribulation or suffering.
