NOTED SPEAKER COMING.

Hon. John Sharp Williams, of Mississippi, Will Lecture Before the Oregon Chautauqua in July.

The Willamette Valley Chautauqua association will hold its fifteenth assembly at Gladstone Park from July 7 to 19, inclusive. The attractions will consist of 24 great programs, a summer school with 12 excellent instructors, and many other important features that enter into Chautauqua work.

Among the principal attractions will be John Sharp Williams, the leader of Democracy in the house, and recently elected to the senate from the state of Mississippi. He will speak July 10 on the subject, "America for Americans." This lecture will be of particular interest to the people of the Pacific Coast, and no one should miss hearing it. Robert McIntyre, recently elected a bishop of the M. E. church, and who has been styled the "Prince of the Platform," will give on July 17, "The Battle of Life;" on July 18, "The Evolution of Abraham Lincoln," and on July 19 he will deliver one of his wonderful sermons.

Dr. Alfred Montgomery, the great farmer-painter, brings with him \$90,000 worth of paintings, one of them alone being valued at \$20,000. He will appear July 7, 9 and 10. Among the other speakers are Dr. Edwin Southern, Dr. Van Horn of Seattle, and Dr. B. L. Whitman, formerly of Columbia university.

The department work of the Chautauqua is one of its chief features. Classes in art, oratory, elocution and music, literature, science and history will be taught daily by able instructors. Baseball and other athletic sports will be indulged in every afternoon. A kindergarten for the care of children will be established. For farther information, it is advisable to write to H. E.
