THE QUESTION OF A CREDIT CURRENCY.

Whether the State Bankers' association shall endorse credit currency or not is a vital issue of this convention in session at Salem. Whether it shall endorse the Oklahoma plan of securing depositors is another live issue. The fact that one speaker showed that national banks had secured their notes at a cost of LESS THAN ONE-EIGHTH OF ONE PER CENT OUGHT TO SET ALL PERSONS THINKING. It is probable that conservative policies of the bankers will incline them to ignore both questions. But the Oklahoma plan of protecting depositors WILL NOT BE DONE AWAY WITH BY THEIR REFUSAL TO DISCUSS THE QUESTION.

Some such arrangement would inspire confidence in the whole banking situation and be a benefit to the banks. Arthur Reynolds, president of the Des Moines National Bank, member of the Currency commission and committee on Federal Legislation of the National Bankers' association, read upon "Credit Currency." He showed how THE APPEARANCE OF THE CLEARING HOUSE CERTIFICATES HAD CHANGED THE SENTIMENTS OF BANKERS AND LEGISLATORS AND ECONOMISTS in favor of the use of greater volume of credit currency. He said the panic of last fall was due to an irresponsible, inelastic currency. He traced the causes of that distress and suspension of currency payments. When our government had \$900,000,000 gold in its vaults, that panic compelled us to import gold at a profit to Great Britain from the Bank of England, which had only \$165,000,000 surplus gold.

Why should not currency be issued as needed, based upon the assets of banks secured by a gold reserve, be provided by banks, instead of an inelastic system based upon a national debt, be found more stable and satisfactory? There was no elasticity to our currency. We must have the right to issue credit notes in place of book credits. Emergency and panic currency were unfortunately terms that did not help to restore confidence.

He denounced the Aldrich-Vreeland currency bill as a financial bastard and political makeshift. The commission composed of nine senators and nine congressmen were to frame a further bill and if not more in the interest of the people, God save the country! The bill allows the use of \$500,000,000 emergency notes in times of financial stringency, based for security on state, county and municipal bonds, with a clearing house privilege allowing railroad bonds to be used as a basis for currency issues.

He announced in conclusion that in his opinion the use of emergency currency would alarm the public and produce suspension of cash payments.

William Grant of Dallas was elected vice-president and J. D. Smith, secretary.

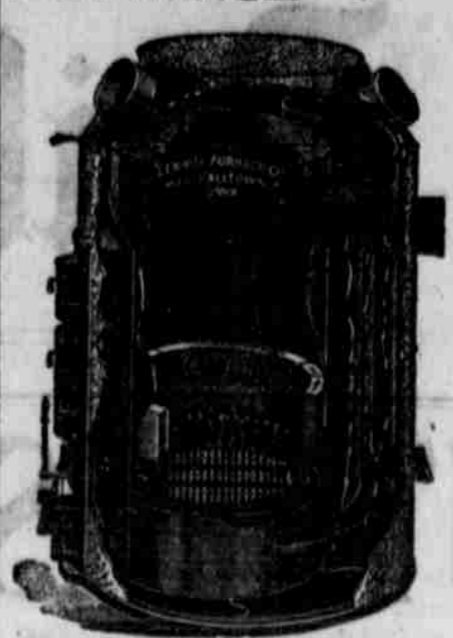
