

IGO, NOTED GUN MAN— ONCE LIVED IN SALEM.

(Corvallis Times.)

A character of more than usual notoriety in former times, passed away Monday at Wrenn, Benton county. He was William Igo, whose title to fame rests on the fact that he was something of a figure in one of the biggest shooting affairs that ever occurred in Oregon. It was back in 1875 or 1876, that a father and two sons were the victims of a feud which brought on two shooting scrapes, and in the last of which, all were killed. They were the Whitneys, of Polk county, and the man who did the shooting was noted Till Glaze, who died some time ago at Prineville. Igo's part in the affair, was that he was a partisan of the Whitneys, and for a time after the first shooting, was employed as a body guard for the father and sons. Those were days of rougher men and ruder society than now, and this feud was one of the worst that ever took place in Oregon. Igo and the Whitneys were in Corvallis once during the days of the feud, and their visit is remembered by old timers, who heard with horror later of the affair, in which Glaze encountered the three Whitneys, and single handed and alone snuffed out the lives of all of them with his ready revolver. The affair made a sensation throughout Oregon at the time, and long afterward, Glaze was pointed out to passersby as a man of formidable character. He was a man of good appearance, of magnificent physical proportions, and a strong and very good looking face. He afterwards became a saloon keeper at Prineville, and was as far as known a peaceable and well behaved citizen. It is said by Corvallis men who remember all about the Glaze-Whitney affair, that Glaze was not the aggressor.

Where Igo was when the final duel occurred, nobody seems to remember. Afterward he went to Salem where he lived for some time, coming then to Benton county, where in Wren precinct, he spent the remainder of his days. Usually he became a well known figure in county elections, where both sides to the contest usually counted more or less on his support, but never with particular certainty. He died at Wren yesterday, and during the afternoon a casket was sent out for use at his burial, which it is supposed took place today. He was something over 60 years of age. He and his brother spent their childhood at the home of Mrs. John Wells of this city. Al Igo, a brother, who was at one time very well known in Corvallis and Salem, is said now to be in Alaska.

BAKER CITY WOOL GROWERS DISAPPOINTED

(Baker City Herald.)

There is considerable disappointment on the part of the wool growers today over the low prices offered for wool at first sales day in Baker. While many of the firms are represented here by buyers up to noon there had been but four lots of wool sold.

Fletcher Bros. sold 10 Charles Greens 5522 pounds at 13 1/2 cents. G. S. L. Smith of John Day sold his clip to Greens for 13 1/2 cents. Greens also purchased \$909 pounds of M. J. F. Morgan at 14 1/2 cents and 4132 pounds to J. C. Moore at 11 1/2 cents. Several growers would not accept the bids made by the buyer on their wool, the prices ranging all the way from 9 1/2 to 13 cents.

There is some talk among the growers that they are victims of a trust on the part of buyers, and they purpose to hold the wool rather than accept the offers made.

BIG SEAWALL TO PROTECT CHICAGO

Old Lake Michigan's ravages may make necessary the building of a breakwater similar to the one at Galveston. This is partly a result of the strong suction of the drainage canal through the Chicago river, which is believed by engineers to make the lake storms more damaging. The new wall a mile and a half long may be built, entailing an expenditure of about \$500,000, in order to protect from ravages by the lake a big sewer that cost \$2,000,000. be done. The federal government may be asked for data showing all the lake currents which affect the shore line. In the question as to whether the city shall pay for this or the Illinois Central railway—which preempted the lake front for its use and wrung an easement from the city years ago—an interesting legal point has arisen. In the easement between the two corporations nothing was said as to which should pay for such improvements. Engineers have asserted that Chicago should take a lesson from Galveston and use a sea wall with the sloping face, although it will cost much more, rather than the old style of a straight wall once considered adequate protection against the lake.
