COMEDY AT GRAND TONIGHT

CALIFORNIA IS HAVING

A GOOD FRUIT YEAR

San Francisco, June 29. — Two causes are combining to make the year 1908 notable in California's industrial history, and the result of this combination will mean much to the progress of the state. The output of fruit will be double that of any previous year, which means prosperity for the agricultural communities, and the whole state is awaking to the fact that debt is sometimes good for a community, with the result that in addition to the eighteen million dollars worth of bonds for municipal improvements that have been voted in San Francisco, many counties are voting bonds for the purpose of building good roads, and for other public betterments.

With the exception of the prune crop in the Santa Clara valley, which produces sixty-five per cent of all the prunes raised in California, there will be a record breaking crop of all fruits this year.
