Culver received a letter from Chief of Police Gritzmacher stating that the wheel had been offered for sale in Portland, and that the thief had probably gone to Vancouver, Wash. The sheriff's office in this city has requested the Portland police to send the wheel by express today.

**Interested in Oregon Law—**  
During the past few days the Secretary of State has received many inquiries from all parts of the United States regarding the result of the vote on the various initiative and referendum measures submitted at the recent election. Some curious questions have been asked concerning the manner in which laws are made by the people in Oregon.

**Mrs. Perkins Sails—**  
Mrs. W. T. Perkins sailed for San Francisco yesterday on the State of California to visit a week with her son, Ensign Fred M. Perkins of the battleship Wisconsin, before the departure of the fleet. Mrs. Perkins will visit friends in Berkeley and San Jose, and will afterwards return to Salem with her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Fred Perkins.

**Cherry Fair Posters—**  
More than 400 copies of the Cherry Fair posters were mailed Saturday. They were sent to each agent on the Harriman lines. Altogether about 900 posters have been mailed.

**The Capital Summer Normal—**  
Opened this morning with an enrollment of 80—the largest opening in the history of the school. Many others will enter during the week. Classes are formed in all the branches for state and county papers, also Latin, stenography, bookkeeping and typewriting.

**Glenn Case Set—**  
The preliminary hearing in the case of H. E. Glenn, who is charged with forgery has been set for 3 o'clock this afternoon. Glenn appeared before Judge Webster this morning with his attorney, P. H. D'Arcy, and stated that he was ready for trial. Walter Winslow will handle the case for the state.

**Postpone Lathrop Hearing—**  
The preliminary hearing before Judge Webster in the case of P. N. Lathrop charged with committing perjury in giving his testimony in the Savage divorce case which was set for 10 o'clock tomorrow, has been continued until July 7th.

**"Drys" Appeal—**  
Judge Galloway denied petition for rehearing in the Polk county local option contest, thus leaving the decision in favor of the dry interest. The case will be appealed to the supreme court.
