### CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Another unusually peaceful meeting of the city fathers was held last evening. Nothing happened to mar the serenity of the occasion, and with the exception of a few remarks by various councilmen as to the proper method of compensating the dog catcher, the meeting dragged calmly on to its uneventful close.

The committee on ordinances reported on the ordinance providing for a pound master, and recommended that the bill pass. The report was adopted. The report of the committee recommending the construction of wooden sidewalks in Yew Park was also adopted. Petitions from R. and E. K. Bedford, S. P. Havem, Suedigar, Wm. Le Mar and others, residing on Broadway, asking that they be allowed to do their own work on the improvement of that street were referred to the street committee.

It was carried that the matter of letting the contract for the improvement of Broadway be placed in the hands of the street committee. The petition of R. K. Page, asking for an extension of ten days on the street work on the improvement of that street were referred to the street committee.

Councilman Stoliz moved that the street committee and the mayor confer to devise some means of bringing the sidewalks to grade on High street between State and Mill.

Upon a motion by Councilman Stoliz the city engineer was requested to establish a grade on North Commercial street near the North Commercial street bridge, so as to make a better and safer approach to the bridge.

The city engineer was also instructed to contract with the Warren Construction company to replace the inlets by catch basins on State street at the corners of Church, Winter and Cottage streets.

Upon a motion by Councilman Radcliff the city marshal was authorized to employ assistants during the Fourth of July and the Cherry Fair, and also to appoint substitutes for the night policemen who are to take their vacations.

The special committee on the improvement of Court street, recommended that Court street be paved and parked from Twelfth to Church streets. The report was adopted.

Councilman Elliott moved that Mr. Elgin be employed to copy the assessment rolls of those required to pay poll tax.

Mr. Frank Powers of the Cherry Fair committee of the Board of Trade asked for permission to put up tents upon any street, and also for the privilege of collecting fees from concessionaires to help defray the expenses of the fair. He also asked that the committee be allowed to swear in the night watch at the Cherry Fair as a special policeman, for the protection of the cherry display. The requests were granted.

August Huckestein requested that the Fourth of July committee be allowed the privilege of collecting fees from the concessionaires on the Fourth of July, and that the funds be turned into the Fourth of July fund.

In regard to the illuminating system which is to be adopted, Mr. Huckestein said that it was the intention of the committee to have the electric streamers burn throughout the year. The business houses will pay for this, but he asked that the city council give \$100 to help

pay for the streamers. The cost of the streamers is \$400.

Upon a motion by Councilman Greenbaum the Fourth of July committee was given the privilege of collecting the concession fees. The matter of granting \$100 to help pay for the streamers was referred to the committee on current expenses.

A resolution passed at a joint meeting of the Board of Trade and the Business Men's league, asking that the city council express its intention of paving Twelfth street from State street to the S. P. Depot was referred to the street committee.

A resolution requesting the Southern Pacific company to construct a crossing on its property near the property of George Smith at the entrance of the Fair Grounds, and authorizing the city recorder to mail a copy of the resolution to the Southern Pacific company was adopted.

Mayor Rodgers suggested that that the section of the gasoline ordinance pertaining to the storage of gasoline in private house be amended so that quantities not exceeding one-half gallon for domestic purposes, could be kept without obtaining a special permit. The vote on the ordinance was reconsidered, and Councilman Radcliff moved that the amendment be amended to read five gallon instead of one-half gallon. The amendment to the ordinance was carried, and the amendment as amended was lost, and referred to the committee on ordinances.

The assessment ordinances for the paving of State street from Commercial to Church street was carried to its final reading, and passed. The estimated cost of the improvement is \$21,801.

Councilman Radcliff moved that the city marshal be instructed to rigidly enforce the bicycle ordinance and that if he finds that he cannot do so without assistance, to report the same to the council.

The bill providing for the establishment of a grade on N. Cottage street, between North Mill creek and the south line of the Fair Grounds Grounds roads was passed.

The bill for the improvement of Commercial from Trade street to Center street by paving the space between the street car tracks, was passed. The estimated cost of the improvement is \$7884.85.

The bill for improving North Capital street between North Mill Creek and the Garden road was passed.

The bill for the improvement of Bellevue street from 19th to 14th street was carried to the third reading and passed.

The bill for the establishment of a grade on North Winter street from North Mill creek to the Fair Grounds road was passed.

The bill creating the office of pound master was discussed at length. The bill provides that the pound master shall receive as pay half of all dog licenses. Mayor Rodgers took the floor and objected to this part of the bill, on the ground that under it the pound master would receive pay for something that he had nothing to do with.

Councilman Radcliff stated that the bill was intended to apply only for the remainder of the year, that most of the license had been paid, and that the pound master would have plenty of work in collecting the delinquent licenses.

Mayor Rodgers said that it should not be the policy of the council to pass ordinances for only a few months. "If the pound master

of \$2 a day we can discharge him and get a new one." The ordinance was finally referred to the ordinance committee. Upon a motion by Councilman Millard Ray Welch was appointed pound master.

The sidewalk in front of the property of J. S. Pratt in Yew Park was ordered built and the lien on the property foreclosed. The contract was awarded to J. P. Harris.

The street commissioner was ordered to construct a cement crossing in the alley on Marion street near 12th street.

Applications for liquor licenses from the following firms were referred to the committee on licenses: Joe A. Tyler and Sibaris and James, four licenses to the Standard Liquor company, to W. R. Anderson, J. A. Cooper, Butte and Wenderoth, and Bach and Nadstane were granted.
