SEVERELY BEATEN

TRY TO RESCUE SUFFRAGETTES UNDER ARREST—OFFICERS HAVE TO USE CLUBS—MANY GO TO PRISON.

London, July 1.—Bleeding from gashes cut by the clubs of policemen, with disheveled hair and torn dresses, after a night of demonstration, more than a thousand suffragettes made a desperate attempt today to rescue 28 of their members, who were arrested last night and were

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POSSES SURROUND KIDNAPER

CATCH ACCOMPLICE

MAY BE CAUGHT ANY MOMENT—GIRL TELLS STORY—FEELING RUNS HIGH—FATHER GIVES RECURERS BIG SUM.

Coalinga, Ga., July 1.—Tony Loveall, leader of the kidnaping yesterday of Edna Domengine, the 18-year-old daughter of Adolph Domengine, is at bay today in Warthan canyon, 15 miles from here. He is surrounded by a posse of determined men, heavily armed, and his death or capture is expected to be reported at any time.

Edna, the girl who underwent the tragic experience, is at her home today, suffering from nervousness and slight bruises but not seriously injured in any way. Her feet were badly cut by stones when she was forced to walk over rocky roads, her sole garment being the night dress which she wore when dragged from her father's house.

Cleve Rogers, the young kidnaper, who was captured last evening by a posse after being traced to a lonely mountain cabin and after using the girl as a shield against bullets from his pursuers, is in jail here. Feeling against him does not run high as the girl says he offered her no affront.

A pathetic feature of the remarkable case is the fact that one of the leaders of the posse, which captured Rogers, was his own father. The older man had no idea that it was his son, whom he was following with a gun and when he saw the boy he collapsed.

The recentment of the community is directed against Loveall, who is alleged to have planned the daring kidnaping and burning of the out-houses on the Domengine place.

This feeling has been increased by the discovery today that when Loveall sent Rogers ahead with the girl, he fell back and joined the posse, avoiding suspicion, until the girl was rescued. Then he quietly slipped away and was out of sight before the searchers learned from Rogers that he was the other kidnaper.

Adolph Domengine, the father of the girl, today announced that he would give a reward of \$5000 to the four men who led the attack on Rogers and rescued the girl. This is the full amount of the ransom demanded by the kidnapers.

Miss Domengine is the object of sympathy from everyone in this section and was the recipient of many presents and delicacies today from woman friends.

She stood the ordeal bravely and was able to give a clear account of the wild trip, part of which she was forced to take, thrown over a horse's back like a sack of meat. She suffered most from the stones which cut her bare feet.

The beautiful girl is a graduate of Holy Cross college at Santa Cruz and has many attainments and sweet traits of character which have endeared her to the community. The kidnapers knew well that she was the pride of her father's life.

FIENDISH CHICAGO MURDER

BEATEN AND KILLED

WOMAN FOUND BOUND WITH HEAD CRUSHED—SENSATION EXPECTED—WELL DRESSED AND OWNED MUCH JEWELRY.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, July 1.—With the cord which strangled her tightly twisted into the flesh of her neck and a sheet tied about her mouth as a gag, the naked body of a woman believed to be Mrs. E. Thompson, was found in a pool of blood today in a room in a local lodging house. Her feet and arms were tightly bound with a rope, her skull crushed and bruises on her body showed that she had been brutally kicked and beaten by the murderer before he committed the fiendish crime. J. H. Raymond, who rented the room for his "wife," is being sought by the authorities.

Detectives have secured valuable clues to the woman's identity and are now positive that the stranger's victim is of prominence in Illinois.

Several of the largest jewelry firms here state that Mrs. E. Thompson, of Oak Park, Ill., has been a frequent customer and Levy Bros. report that the woman recently exchanged a diamond ring for a larger stone and paid the difference.

When Mrs. Mary Berberbrug, landlady of the lodging house where the murder was committed, discovered the body today it was evident the woman had been dead for three or four days.

Raymond rented the room last week. Sunday he disappeared and has not been seen since. He is described as being about 35 years old, tall, good looking and apparently prosperous.

When he departed Raymond explained to Mrs. Berberbrug that he would return in a few days. The landlady had no occasion to visit the room, for which rent had been paid in advance until today. Until she discovered the tragedy she had believed that Raymond's wife had accompanied him on his trip.

The dead woman was about 35 years old, pretty and well dressed.

In the room where the murder was committed two diamond rings and a diamond stick pin were found. Purchase slips for \$350 worth of jewelry and diamonds, addressed to Mrs. E. Thompson, were among other articles discovered.

The authorities believe the murder will develop a sensation involving the names of persons of such prominence that they will startle the entire country. Both "Raymond" and the woman bore the appearance of aristocratic breeding.

From the appearance of the room the police believe Raymond fiendishly tortured the woman, kicking and beating her, before he finally took her life. It is supposed that he bound and gagged her then to torment her for hours before strangling her life out with the cord found twisted about her beautiful throat. Occupants of the adjoining apartments say they heard no unusual sounds in the room and that Raymond must have surprised and gagged the woman before she could make an outcry.

TEN YEARS FOR BANK WRECKER

NEARLY GOES MAD

SECOND OFFICIAL TO SUFFER PENALTY FOR VIOLATING TRUST—COLLAPSES WHEN LEARNS FATE.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, July 1.—Walter J. Barnett, attorney and vice president for the defunct California Safe Deposit & Trust company and former vice president of the Western Pacific railroad, was sentenced to 10 years in San Quentin prison today upon conviction for embezzlement of the Colton securities. Barnett nearly collapsed and entered his cell in the county jail with blanched face. A petition of his attorneys for his release on bail pending an appeal will be heard tomorrow morning.

In pronouncing sentence on Barnett Judge Conley said the jury had no right to recommend leniency for the prisoner. In a brief review of the case he declared he could see no reason why the court should be lenient in the matter as the evidence showed the unquestionable guilt of the defendant.

Barnett was convicted on the specific charge of embezzling securities belonging to the estate of the late Mrs. Ella Colton of Washington, D. C. The will left by Mrs. Colton gave securities in the amount of \$205,000 to her legatees, Catherine C. Dahlgren, Grace Catherine Agnew, Theodora Cook, Montgomery Martin and Helene M. B. Sacher.

Rebels Besiege Tabriz.

St. Petersburg, July 1.—News of the first decisive battle of the revolution in Persia reached this city early today. The city of Tabriz in the north of Persia, where the rebels had concentrated their forces for the fight in the north, is in a state of siege and heavy fighting is going on. Over 200 have already been killed by the Shah's troops and the city is expected to fall. It is feared that when the troops of the ruler get into the city, a general massacre will take place.

The fighting at Tabriz started last night. The soldiers of the constitutional party had concentrated in the city for their big battle against the Shah's troops. For several weeks they have been collecting in Tabriz in preparation for the coming struggle. Reinforcements had been sent from the south and the disaffected provinces of northern Persia and Russian soldiers are reported to be allied with the malcontents.

Belive Reports Exaggerated.

Vienna, July 1.—The reports from St. Petersburg to the effect that there is a revolution in the north of Persia are regarded with suspicion here. It is thought that the reports are purposely exaggerated in order to give the Czar a pretext to make a military demonstration in the north of Persia. The situation is being watched with the keenest interest.

COMMUTE ORCHARD SENTENCE

NATURAL LIFE TERM

BOARD OF PARDONS SAYS HE IS DUE CLEMENCY—MURDERER CLAIMS HE DID NOT WANT IT.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Boise, Idaho, July 1.—While Harry Orchard was still praying that no action would be taken to prevent him from going to the gallows next Friday for the assassination of Former Governor Steunenberg, the board of pardons announced today that it had decided to commute his sentence of death to life imprisonment.

When the news was brought to Orchard in his cell he failed to greet it with the same show of gratification that would be expected from a man standing in the shadow of the gallows.

"I am not at all pleased," he remarked. "I have repeatedly told my lawyers not to make a fight for my life. Now they have done the very thing I have been trying to avoid. I would rather die on Friday than spend the rest of my life in prison."

Orchard earned the price of his testimony in the Haywood and Pettibone cases, though he did not seek it. To the last he expressed hope that the sentence of death would not be interfered with. Frank Wyman, appointed by the court to look after the interests of the condemned man, appeared before the board of pardons today and asked that the life of his client be spared. He argued the case solely from a legal standpoint, stating by accepting his testimony the state was both morally and legally bound to extend clemency. The recommendation made by Judge Wood was also produced. Wyman was the only person who appeared before the board of pardons.

JAPANESE STOP BUILDING ON BATTLESHIPS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Tokio, July 1.—Two battleships and two cruisers under construction in Japanese navy yards will not be completed immediately, because of the postponement of the navy department program, according to a report here today. Repairs of the ships captured from the Russians will be rushed, however, so they will be in condition to participate in the naval maneuvers to be conducted this fall.

CHAS. M. SHORTRIDGE ON HONEYMOON

San Jose, Cal., July 1.—Charles M. Shortridge, former state senator, newspaper publisher and politician, and his bride, started on their honeymoon trip today. Shortridge was married to Mrs. Melmas Martin, a daughter of the late Carrie E. Stevens Walter, writer and journalist. Mrs. Shortridge's little daughter accompanied her mother to the altar. The late Mrs. Walter was formerly city editor of Shortridge's paper here and did much to make it a success. She died from a cold contracted at her desk and Shortridge shortly afterward became engaged to her daughter.
