Chamberlain, Maler, Spence, voted no.

On motion the board voted to recommend to the legislature the enactment of a law providing for one board for all state schools.

The committee of Drain citizens appeared before the board and withdrew their offer to contribute funds to maintain the central Oregon normal school. The executive committee was placed in charge of the property.

### Election of Officers.

Governor Chamberlain was re-elected chairman of the board, C. L. Starr secretary, C. E. Spence of Carus was re-appointed regent for six years, and all standing committees were re-appointed.

The executive committee was authorized to employ Harry M. Shafer of Cheney, Wash., or J. R. Campbell of Weatherford, Oklahoma, as president of the Ashland normal school.

The committee reports on faculties for the three schools were adopted. There are still a number of vacancies left to be filled by the board. The board adjourned to meet in October. Subject to call of the president, when the legislative report will be adopted.

Presidents R. L. French and E. D. Ressler were re-elected for Drain and Monmouth.

## DRAIN NORMAL ABOLISHED

## FAVOR 3 SCHOOLS

STATE BOARD OF REGENTS RAISES STANDARD OF ADMISSIONS AND FAVORS ONE BOARD FOR STATE SCHOOLS.

The most significant action of the state board of regents of Oregon normal schools was the abolition of Drain normal, raising the standard

of admission to the ninth grade by creating a sub-normal grade, and adopting a resolution favoring a state board of not more than five to handle all the educational institutions of the state. This would abolish the present normal school board, and also abolish the present boards of regents of the state university and the state agricultural college.

If the reforms proposed by this board are carried into effect the state would save several hundred thousand dollars annually, and the warfare over support of higher education would be at an end.

The annual meeting of the Regents of Normal Schools was held all day Tuesday at the State House. All nine members were present and the work of the year was reviewed and closed up.

### Report of Weston.

President Finch made a strong point of the great need of building up a strong educational center in Eastern Oregon.

Two seniors failed to pass but will finish next year. A training school is needed to utilize all the children for training classes. There were 14 teachers, teaching five and six periods of 45 minutes length each. A dormitory for 50 boys was needed at once to accommodate increased attendance. District funds amounting to \$3000 would be available if the district school were made the training department.	

### Report of Ashland.

Normal students	172
Training department	122

Seniors failed	5
Two music teachers are employed, one at \$25, one at \$125 a year. They collect 50 cents a lesson from pupils. Enrollment next year, 350 to 400. Acting president Payne asked a leave of absence for one year to prepare himself for better work as a teacher in science. He took up the work under adverse circumstances on resignation of President Mulkey and made a splendid showing. President Clyde A. Payne recommended a reduction in teaching force. He had nine in normal department, four in training department, and two in music, and would do the work with four less. At present teachers put	

in on an average three periods a day of 40 minutes each—or two hours of 60 minutes each.

### The Drain Report.

Mr. Geo. Bassett of the Drain Citizens' committee addressed the board on the financial condition of Drain normal. He showed that the special tax voted by the district, the money raised by the citizens and the fees collected would run the normal school at Drain until March 1st. Mr. Cool addressed the board, showing that in spite of hard times the farmers and business men had raised the money to carry on the school until next March. On motion the donations were accepted as per resolution of 1907, without recourse to the legislature.

### Report of Monmouth.

Normal department	173
Training department	137
Graduates	48
The average age of students was over 18 for the whole 173, only 12 under 18. Cost was \$14,000 the past year; \$5000 by the district, \$3500 in fees, and \$5500 in donations. Faculty have none less than five periods a day except teacher of English who had training in recitations, and averaged 20 hours a week. It was shown that a dormitory of 100 rooms would add to attendance and increase revenues \$4000 a year. Mr. Ressler submitted a budget for ensuing year.	

### Location of Schools.

W. B. Ayer advocated two normal schools—one in eastern and one in Western Oregon. C. E. Spence seconded, J. H. Ackerman moved to amend by naming Weston, Monmouth and Ashland as the schools to be supported by the state. F. W. Benson moved to add Drain to the list of schools to be supported. Benson amendment was declared lost 2 to 7 votes. On Ackerman amendment, ayes 5, noes 4. Amendment carried. Ayer resolution as amended was adopted. The board will so report to the legislature.
