ACCUSES FATHER OF CRIME

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Woodland, Cal., July 1.—Authorities of Napa county today are investigating the sensational story told by Mrs. George Babcock, who has signed an affidavit accusing her father, James L. Shroyer, of complicity in the murder of John Woodapple, whose body was found in the embers of his burning cabin in the first part of this year. Mrs. Babcock accused Lawrence Lund, Shroyer's employe, of the actual commission of the crime.

According to the woman's story, Shroyer and Lund, who were neighbors of Woodapple in Malarkey canyon in the Napa mountains, were prompted by avarice. Woodapple was supposed to keep his savings in a mysterious box, which Mrs. Babcock says her father and Lund stole, after the rancher had been struck down by a neck yoke and his cabin set on fire.

When Mrs. Babcock appeared before the district attorney here and made an affidavit accusing the mer of Woodapple's murder she explained that her conscience would not allow her to conceal her father's guilt.

FINANCIALLY EMBARRASSED BY BANK WRECKERS

(United Press Leased Wire.)
 Washington, July 1.—Financially embarrassed by the embezzlement of \$285,000 by W. J. Barnett and J. Dalzell Brown, trustees of the estate of Mrs. Ella Colton, are going to sell her palatial residence, 1617 Connecticut avenue, Washington. Although the estate is worth millions of dollars the loss of the securities reduced the ready cash to such a point that thousands of dollars in debts and taxes remain unpaid.

Convictions at San Francisco of J. Dalzell Brown and W. J. Barnett of embezzlement in the Colton securities made it impossible for the estate to secure judgment against the defunct California Safe Deposit & Trust company, the matter having been made personal. The conviction of its officers as individuals freed the bank from liability.

Conrad P. Syme and R. G. Donaldson have been appointed trustees of the Colton estate and instructed by the court to sell the mansion. The trustees are authorized to raise a levy of \$50,000 pending the sale of the property.
