WOMEN WORKING IN PANAMA CANAL ZONE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, June 30.—In spite of the rule of the Canal commission to bar women out of the service because the Isthmus is no place for them, 205 have succeeded in finding a place upon the list of gold employes.

Women have been employed to teach in the schools, as they have been employed to nurse in the hospitals, on account of their natural qualifications for the work and because at the salaries paid it is easier to secure women with the requisite experience than men. Of the 25 women teachers now employed a majority are the wives or the daughters of male employes who were living in the Canal Zone prior to their appointment, and comparatively few women teachers have been brought from the United States. The first of the Canal Zone free public schools was opened in January 1906, at Corozal with Miss Emily Kyte as teacher.

In addition to the nurses and the teachers, 45 women are employed by the commission on a gold basis. Seventeen of these are rated as copyists, ten as coupon counters, four as clerks, two as postal clerks, two as dietitians, two as laundresses, two as matrons, two as timekeepers, one as telegrapher, one as storekeeper, and one is employed on special service. The highest salary paid any woman in the service is \$175 a month, and the lowest salary paid is \$25 a month. The average salary of the women now in the service is \$73.90 a month.

Women have not been generally employed in clerical positions, because the Commission cannot undertake except at a disproportionate expense, to provide quarters for female employes. Almost without exception, the women who have secured appointments in the offices of the various departments are related to male employes occupying married quarters, who provide them a home.

CANAL COMMISSION WATCHES FOR BACHELORS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, July 1.—The Panama Canal Commission has found that the ordinary variety of bachelor is an incubus in the social economy of the zone. Suggestions have been made by the married members of the payroll to institute a curfew ordinance to make them go to bed at a proper time. Now the commission has discovered that the West Indian variety of bachelor doesn't know how to feed himself properly and as a result has undertaken to do that for him since June 1.

The West Indian bachelor, according to the Record, "is so frugal or careless that he actually denies himself the food necessary to sustain himself at the highest point of efficiency for his arduous work. To protect him from this is the object of requiring him to get his food at the mess kitchens. He is left no choice in the matter. Like our own boyhood experiences when mother made us eat horrid string beans or squash before we could have cherry pie, he is obliged to file up to the long counter and receive his rations. He might just as well do this as he has to pay for it anyway, so he usually does. The cost of the mess is checked against his wages.

This is only one of the lamentable defects of the bachelor that has been brought to light by canal experience. According to the protests of the domestic variety of workmen he behaves very badly on almost all occasions. He refuses to go to bed at a seemly hour. He sits out under the palms and sings "My Bonnie Lies Over the Ocean" when self-respecting persons have put out the lights and gone to bed. Sometimes he is boisterous when taking the early morning shower and occasions have been known when he sang riotously returning from a late dinner. There are only two effective courses to be followed, according to the experience of the commission—treat the bachelor as a belligerent boy, or marry him off.

REFORM NOT APPRECIATED IN THE PHILIPPINES

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, July 1.—Reform of the Anthony Comstock variety refuses to "take" in the Philippines, according to information received at the war department. The reformers in that archipelago have recently been given involuntarily membership cards in the Down and Out Club.

The New York stunt of putting the kibosh to horse racing resulted in total failure. The Assembly, the first ever held in the Islands, declined to put a ban on the sport, and the bookies will remain undisturbed in the distant habitation. The Filipinos see nothing cruel or offensive in betting on horse races, until they lose, and then the resentment is passing.

Efforts were made to put the cockpit out of commission in Manila. But the game rooster men were too influential. "Effort made to close cockpit unsuccessful; protests of indignation by American ladies, Philippine Teachers' association, 2,500 Filipinos against exploitation Pilipino vice," read a cablegram sent to President Roosevelt for aid. The pugnacity of roosters is still put to the test, however, in the Manila cockpits.

The most alarming reform attempted was that to prohibit the importation and sale of playing cards. Not only the gamblers, but the American woman put down "her little foot" real hard, when they heard of that movement. The importation of playing cards from Spain is a considerable item commercially, and the Spanish consul general hot-footed it to Governor-General Smith to protest against such action. Again the Filipino assembly prevented a horrible raid on the amusements of the islands by putting a quietus to the movement.
