THE SALEM AND STAYTON AND THE SALEM AND SILVERTON ELECTRIC RAILROADS.

There has been a great deal of newspaper talk about the above projects.

In one way the people pay too much attention to newspaper talk and SETTLE BACK AND TAKE THINGS FOR GRANTED AND DO NOTHING.

The newspapers are expected to boost and puff and blow about such things and thereby many are deceived.

For instance, the statements published about the Stayton and Salem electric line being built on the Welch plan.

NOW, WHAT WAS REALLY DONE IN THAT MATTER?

A committee of citizens from the towns on the line and a few Salem business men promoted a plan of stock subscription.

On that plan, which was fully made public BETWEEN THIRTY AND FORTY THOUSAND DOLLARS WAS SUBSCRIBED.

The business men at Aumsville and Stayton and Turner took the matter up and subscribed liberally—from \$100 to \$2000 each.

At Salem the committee composed of J. Frank Hughes, W. Y. Richardson and E. Hofer SUBSCRIBED \$500 EACH.

Grocer Eppley and job printer Elliott subscribed \$100 each purely voluntarily. Others said they would subscribe.

Before the matter could be pushed further—the election intervening—Mr. Welch and Mr. Waters made a proposition and a COMMITTEE WAS APPOINTED TO CONSIDER THAT.

The committee was composed of Banker Freres of Stayton, Sherman Swank of Stayton and County Treasurer Richardson of Salem.

They called on Welch and Waters and had matters explained to them and accepted the Welch-Waters proposition TO SUBSCRIBE FOR \$100,000 BONDS.

If the bonds are subscribed for Welch and Waters agree to build the line from Salem to Stayton.

The bonds are to run five years, draw six per cent, and are to be A FIRST MORTGAGE ON THE PROPERTY.

That is a good plan on which to build the road, and is the only plan now pending for the construction of the Salem and Stayton electric road. But merely accepting Mr. Welch's plan does not build the road. THE BONDS HAVE NOT BEEN SUBSCRIBED FOR.

Unless the \$100,000 of bonds are subscribed for no road will be built.

DEPOSITORS in the savings department of the Capital National Bank are requested to present their pass books for the purpose of having credited the semi-annual interest due July 1.

Full page headlines indicated that the road was already built.

If the property owners and business men and capitalists of this city mean business and want to see that road built LET THEM SUBSCRIBE FOR BONDS.

The committee that worked on the stock subscription plan showed good faith in their plan by putting their names down for \$500 each.

Waters' office has superseded the Welch plan. Let those who are back of that GET THEIR COMMITTEES OUT AND PUSH IT TO COMPLETION.

The Welch plan accepted in Mr. Maters' office has superseded the other plan.

It is a good plan. Let it not be put to sleep by indifference. Let this community show its good faith or forever keep still about railroads.

No such pickup was ever offered a community. If Salem will do one half the subscribing, THE LITTLE TOWNS WILL CARRY THE BALANCE.

It is a downright lack of capacity and lack of faith in our city and its future to neglect so splendid an opportunity.

The road from Salem to Stayton, as soon as built WILL BE WORTH THREE OR FOUR TIMES the \$100,000 bonds that are asked to be taken.

Are there not one hundred men of nerve and faith and confidence in the future of Salem and the Willamette Valley to take \$1000 apiece?

THEN WE ARE POOR AND APATHETIC INDEED.

The Journal has reviewed this matter to let all know just exactly how it stands, and that no one be resting under a false apprehension.

Let no one be deceived. If this matter is let to rest, is put to sleep, THERE IS NO BLAME ATTACHED TO US.

This line would tap the trade naturally belonging to this city. It would make Salem a distributing center.

These matters have all been shown up. Are we dead and asleep, or are we being doped with soporifics judiciously administered?
