TICKETS FOR ONE HUNDRED CARLOADS ALREADY SOLD AT PORTLAND

An extra force of police will have to be detailed to all the principal points in the city, and private residences must not be too carelessly left unguarded.

The fire department will have to be on constant alarm duty, as the dangers of fire with high winds would be enormous.

Space in all the farmers feed sheds has been engaged far in advance and the livery barns and horse stables will be overflowing.

Salem people are warned not to leave the city but to stay in town and look after their property.

Every church and lodge should organize and make an effort to help feed the multitudes.

The nation's birthday will be honored at Salem with the greatest display in western Oregon.

A program from sunrise to midnight has been arranged by the bright and brainy young business men of the Capital City.

The Southern Pacific will give excursion rates from all points to Salem and return good for three days.

The Oregon Electric has chartered all the cars that can be secured at Portland for carrying the crowds to Salem.

Up to Thursday night 6000 tickets had been sold and over 100 cars will be required to carry people to Salem on that line alone.

Every steamer on the river will run excursions all day.

The only danger now is that there will be such a food famine at Salem that visitors will break into houses to get something to eat.

Private citizens are planning to bring their lunches down so as to be sure to get their midday meal.

LABOR IS READY TO BATTLE

FOR THEIR PLANK

LEADERS IN DENVER—IF ANTI-INJUNCTION SECTION IS NOT MADE—STRONG LABOR PARTY WILL BE ELAUNCHED.

Denver, Colo., July 3.—Labor is here to make its fight, around which will center the chief interest of the Democratic convention next week.

The contest for an anti-injunction plank that will "get results" at Chicago was a mere skirmish compared to the battle that is to be fought here, if the statements of the leaders are correct.

The Democrats are facing the open threat, backed by the strongest indications of sincerity, that failure to incorporate in the platform a strong, plain, conclusive plank, pledging the party, if successful, to enact laws that will prevent the use of courts "by corporations against the labor unions" will mean the immediate launching of a labor party.

On the other hand the Democrats are promised the support of labor if they put in the "right kind of a plank."

Among the labor leaders who are here today are: H. P. Perham, president of the railway telegraphers; P. H. Morrissey, grand chief of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen; A. B. Garretson, grand chief of the Order of Railway Conductors, and James O'Connell, national president of the machinists' union. Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, is enroute.

The leaders say that the Nebraska plank is all right as far as it goes but that it is not conclusive enough. They are fighting for the strongest possible wording, which will not go without the bounds of what they consider a proper respect for the courts which they say they do not desire in any way to attack or undermine.

When the police arrived, two of the negroes made their escape. Labor is not fighting its battle alone, either. Many of the advance delegations arriving here bring support to the anti-injunction plank. The main opposition is expected from New York and the east.

Alton B. Parker's alleged plan to attack the anti-injunction plank covertly in a resolution in memory of the late Grover Cleveland, has brought down great criticism upon his head and on every side the pro labor men are condemning him for dragging the issue forward under such a guise.

Congressman William Sulzer of

New York after conferring with William J. Bryan, today said: "Bryan gave me assurance that when the platform is adopted by the Democratic national convention, it will contain the following:

"A plank declaring strongly against injunctions in labor disputes.
"A plank demanding a representative of labor in the cabinet.
"A sweeping clause in favor of the merchant marine.
"And an effective declaration in favor of a national good roads movement."

Sulzer said that he believes Bryan favors Charles A. Towne of New York as the vice presidential candidate, though he said Bryan would not admit it.
