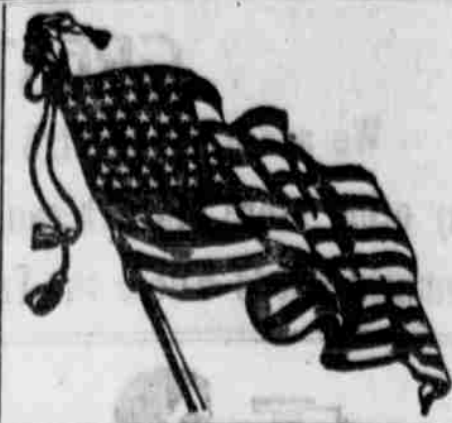

LATE CYCLING NEWS

(By Frank J. Moore.)

Hunting Toys on a Motorcycle.

A very remarkable motorcycle journey, and one in which the results to be obtained are quite out of the ordinary, has just been begun by J. Stout, a St. Paul newspaper man. Mr. Stout is better known by his riding name of "Jack Knife." He has planned a tour of thousands of miles, that will begin in England, and have its eastern end in some point in Asia that has not yet been decided upon. The long ride will be made with a view of finding new models of toys for little folks. He will send back specimens of the toys that he thinks have never been seen on this side of the Atlantic, and which can be adapted for use by American children, together with descriptive notes telling of the manner in which they are manufactured abroad. This, it will be seen, opens up a fascinating field, and offers an unusual opportunity for studying the habits of strange races. It may be taken for granted that after Mr. Stout leaves the main travelled routes, he will find nothing that will seem as strange to him, as the swift-flying machine he rides will be to many of the communities that he will visit. In many ways, too, the trip will be a long drawn out endurance and reliability contest, which will be of interest to both motorcycle riders and motorcycle manufacturers.

Dogging the Flying Wheels.

With more bicycles on the streets than have been seen in any other year of the present century, with the number of motorcycles increasing every day, and with no lack of automobiles on every highway, the pedestrian needs to be alert and wary. He may be legally entitled to the right of way, but he does not wish that fact to be the basis for a damage suit for the benefit of his estate. It is well to remember, therefore, that the principal danger to pedestrians comes when they hesitate. If they keep going in the direction for which they start they are usually safer than if they stop, and certainly a great deal safer, in most cases, than when they turn and retrace their steps. The bicyclist or motorcyclist—and the chauffeur as well—when he sees a person crossing the street, figures that when his vehicle reaches that point, the latter will have gone forward. He is able to judge his own rate of speed exactly, and can estimate the distance needed to ensure safety for all hands. But he cannot tell what is in the pedestrian's mind, nor force a dangerous jump backward at the critical moment. If people would only observe the simple rule of walking in a straight line in the direction

In which they start, accidents on the highway would be many times fewer.

By Wheel Across the Continent.

L. S. Jacobson, of Los Angeles, is now making a long distance bicycle tour, which began June 4th, and will not be concluded until October 1st. Mr. Jacobson will cross the United States in a roundabout fashion. He started from Tia Juana, Cal., which is the most southerly town of the country on the Pacific side, and will finish in Boston. Enroute he will visit the Yosemite Valley, San Francisco, Portland, Seattle, and thence go east along the line of the Northern Pacific. When Yellowstone Park is reached Mr. Jacobson will spend about three weeks in seeing the wonders of Uncle Sam's great out-of-doors museum. From there he will follow the railroad to Minneapolis and St. Paul, thence southeast to Chicago. From the Windy City he will follow the line of the Michigan Central to Detroit, skirt the north shore of Lake Erie to Buffalo, cross New York state to Albany, and follow the good roads of New England to Boston. Mr. Jacobson has reduced his luggage to about 20 pounds, and the pleasant tour he has planned for himself sounds good to every cyclist who has ever experienced the exhilaration of long distance cycling.
