acquaintances of Prescott, went aboard the Connecticut to identify the man last night they discovered that Bateman was being wrongfully held. They signed an affidavit to the effect that Bateman was not Prescott and the fireman was immediately released.

Seven Vacancies.

Washington, July 7.—The death of Rear Admiral Thomas, the retirement of Rear Admiral Richardson Clover, president of the board of inspection and survey; the retirement of Rear Admiral Burwell, commandant of the Puget Sound navy yard, will cause the creation of seven new rear admirals in July.

Captain John E. Pillsbury, chief of the bureau of navigation; Captain Adolph Marx, chairman of the light-house board, and Captain Raymond P. Rogers, chief intelligence officer, are the officers promoted by the death of Rear Admiral Thomas.

The men advanced by the retirement of Admiral Clover are Captain Royal Ingersoll, former chief of staff of the Atlantic fleet, now on duty with the general board; Captain E. Schroeder, of the fourth division, and Captain Richard Wainwright, of the second division of the Atlantic fleet.

Captain Thomas McLean, senior member of the board of inspection and survey, will be advanced to rear admiral when Admiral Burwell retires.
