Lost—Rat Trainer.

The University of Chicago has lost its head trainer of white rats. This does not imply that the education of rodents is a regular feature of that university's curriculum, but nevertheless, Professor John B. Watson, of the department of psychology, owed his Ph. D. degrees and present position to his success in training these animals, and he has just been called to a higher position at the John Hopkin's university at Baltimore. The experiments that made Dr. Watson's fame were highly unique and may throw important light on the development of human beings, scientists declare. The object of the investigation briefly was to discover whether the higher members of the animal kingdom, including rodents and babies, can be considered to possess any real intelligence prior to the full development of the nervous system. The results indicated that they can, and incidentally established for all time the exact number of minutes it will take an average hungry rat to find a way into a box when there is cheese in the box. The principal experiments consisted in timing the successive attempts of a young rat to get into a cage, opening by a latch string which had been moistened with cheese. The first attempts took ten or 15 minutes but after a number of trials a light began to dawn on the rat and thereafter he made a bee line for the string as soon as he was released. The old rats took more time to solve the puzzle but their memory proved better than that of the youngsters. One old one took 55 minutes to learn a complicated method of entering the food box, but the second time he was placed near it he did the trick in exactly one minute and a half. It is said that John D. Rockefeller was highly pleased at the ingenuity shown in the experiments.

IROQUOIS CLUB PAYS TRIBUTE TO CLEVELAND

Chicago's final tribute to the memory of Grover Cleveland will take the form of a big memorial meeting to be held in the Auditorium next Sunday, July 12. Personal friends and political associates of the former president will make the leading addresses and thousands of citizens of Chicago will unite with them to do honor to the "Sage of Princeton." The meeting will be held under the auspices of the Iroquois club, the Democratic club of the city. From the day that the news of Grover Cleveland's death reached Chicago, association, clubs and public bodies here have vied with each other in bearing witness to the admiration and affection with which the former president was regarded, by Democrats and Republicans alike. The Board of Trade was one of the first bodies to take official action and summed up the feeling of the city and of the entire country in the following striking resolution: "On June 24 the mortal life of Grover Cleveland was ended. The record of his career as President of the United States for two full terms, and in other capacities, both private and public, is one of lofty patriotism, of unsurpassed courage, of unswerving fidelity to great and immutable principles, of profound statesmanship, of unhesitating loyalty to his convictions regardless of personal considerations or political affiliations. In the great crises that made illustrious his presidency he kept unswayed and solely in view the maintenance of law and order and the glory of the republic. No sophistry ever pierced his armor of righteousness. He was great in living and ineffaceable in his greatness. His name is written in

living and ineffaceable characters among the names of our great presidents. The life and character of Grover Cleveland are among the imperishable treasures of the nation." The Board of Trade of Chicago has always been foremost in voicing the unspoken sentiments of its members and of the city in times of national calamity, and in such cases as the Johnstown flood, the Galveston flood and the San Francisco earthquakes, it contributed large sums of money for the relief of the sufferers. Among the other organizations which passed memorial resolutions were the Iroquois club, Union League club, Hamilton club, Illinois Athletic club and the Board of Commissioners of Cook county.
