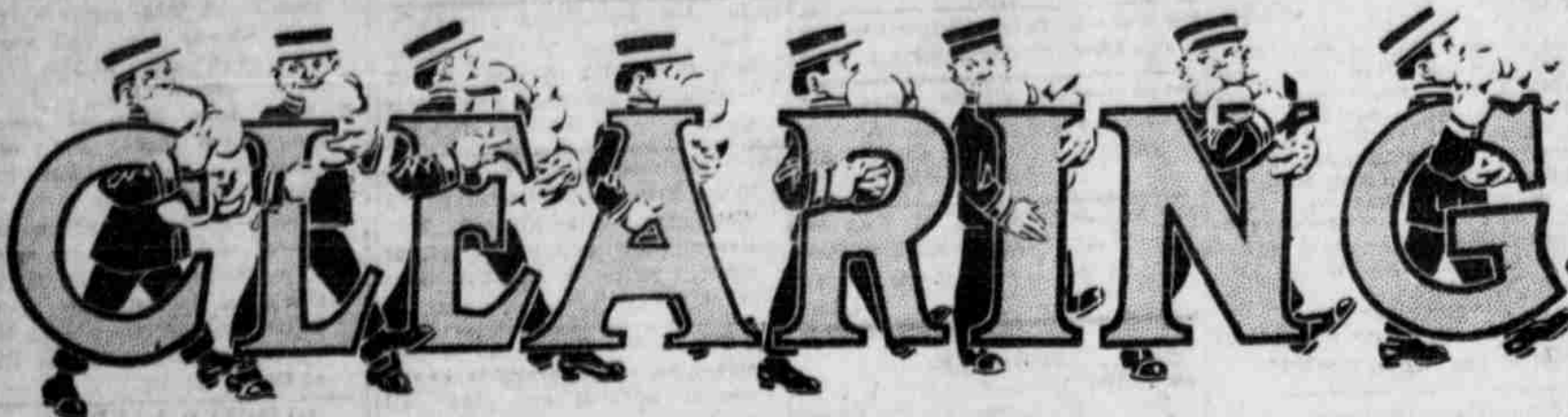

fact that on August 7th, 1907, I wrote the company then operating the Oregon Electric requesting them to conform to the established grade on Broadway. I also wrote to you to the same effect Jan. 15th last.

"Little attention was paid to my correspondence till the city was about to assess you for the much needed improvement of the street; then it was that you interposed your objections to our grade.

"Some weeks ago a majority of the membership of the council, together with our city engineer and myself, went over the entire line of your railway on Broadway in the company of your engineer for the purpose of investigating the grade in its relation to your track.

"Our city engineer reported the grade a proper one. The members of the council by their votes indicated the same opinion. This grade has now been established about a year. Your franchise requires that you conform to the established grade of the city wherever your lines may run and that you alter your tracks to fit any change of grade. The council and its committee have given your company an ample and generous hearing on every phase of the subject. We have waited ten months for your people to act and I think it ill fitting that you now charge us with failure to allot you sufficient time and charge our committee with 'unfairness' in its labors.

"We have no controversy or 'difficulty' with you as you seem to indicate. The grade is established and we ask you to conform to it as per your contract. We are asking the same thing of every property owner on the street and we are assessing them for it. We welcome the Oregon Electric and are willing to do everything reasonable to make its way in Salem smooth, easy and profitable, but we must insist upon the right to establish such grades for our streets as are best calculated to serve as highways for vehicle and pedestrian as well as for railway traffic."

OKLAHOMA INDIANS CAUSING TROUBLE

Oklahoma City, Okla., July 8.—Acting under orders from Acting Governor Bellamy, Oklahoma's whole militia force is prepared today to march at a moment's notice on Old Hickory camp grounds near Muskogee, where several hundred Indians and negroes are encamped. The braves are openly defying county officers who have tried to make them lay down their arms, and are becoming threatening. County officers who visited the camp are protesting against the demonstration. Bloodshed is feared if an attempt is made to forcibly disarm the braves.

ANNA IS AFTER HER CHILDREN

Paris, July 8.—Princess de Sagan began her honeymoon in Paris today by engaging in a legal fight for the custody of her three small sons, the children of Count Boni. The action of her former husband in appearing before Judge Henry Ditte, president of the tribunal of the first instance of the Seine, and seeking to have the custody of the children restored to him was made known to Princess de Sagan while she was still in London and she and the prince decided to fight the count's suit. On her arrival here the princess called in her counsel and it is expected that this afternoon or tomorrow an appearance will be entered before Judge Ditte to answer Boni's suit.

Big Fire in Boston.

Boston, July 8.—The docks of the Cunard Steamship company will be almost a total loss as the result of a fire which is raging this afternoon. The damage already is estimated to be nearly a million dollars.

The Devonian of the Leyland line, which was lying at a pier near the Cunard dock has been removed to a place of safety and is not much damaged. The fire companies from the surrounding districts have been unable to fight the fire successfully and the entire department of Greater Boston has been summoned.

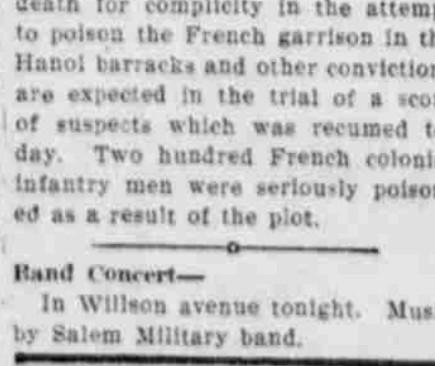
Three lighters and a South America barkentine and over a dozen freight cars owned by the Boston & Maine railroad have been caught by the spreading flames. The burning district is within a mile of the territory swept by the great Chelsea fire and the scenes now parallel those at the great conflagration.

The residents of East Boston in the section near the flames now are throwing their goods into the streets and preparing to vacate their houses fearing that the whole district will be swept by flames.

CHINESE POISONERS EXECUTED

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Saigon, Cochinchina, July 8.—Three leaders of the Chinese rebellion have already been sentenced to death for complicity in the attempt to poison the French garrison in the Hanoi barracks and other convictions are expected in the trial of a score of suspects which was resumed today. Two hundred French colonial infantry men were seriously poisoned as a result of the plot.
