

# WORKING HARD ON PLATFORMS

Auditorium, Dever, July 9.—In the hope of being able to present a completed platform to the democratic national convention immediately after the conclusion of the speech of Permanent Chairman Clay today, the political carpenters had an unusually early breakfast. The general sub-committee of the platform committee got together at 10 o'clock to receive the reports of the various little sub-sub-committees which had been referred the preparation of planks on various subjects. These committees held sessions during the night and agreed upon practically all of the planks in question. Those on injunction, railroads, currency and trust were yet to be agreed upon when the general sub-committee met this morning to formulate its report to the full committee which was scheduled to meet at 10 o'clock.

Before the national convention was called to order at 11 o'clock today, the indications were that there would be considerable debate in the resolutions committee on some of the complete planks, especially those with reference to injunctions, currency, tariff, railroads, trusts and interways.

The general opinion was however, that the finished product would be a platform entirely acceptable to the party.

## The Planks

Among the propositions that were practically certain to be adopted were the following:

Approval of the anti-pass and rebate laws.

Prohibiting corporations from making contributions and providing publicity.

The election of United States senators by direct vote of the people.

Recommending a constitutional amendment permitting an income tax.

The enlargement of the powers of broad commissions, state and national.

Favoring postal savings banks.

The eight-hour day.

Putting wood pulp on the free list.

Opposition to the admission of Asiatic immigration who cannot be assimilated with our population, whose presence would raise a race question.

Anti-injunction plank requiring notice to be given before issuance, and no writ shall remain in force longer than a specified number of days and that in cases of contempt committed outside the presence of the court the defendant shall have a right of trial by jury.

Reduction of tariff on trust matters and general revision of the tariff to restore it to a revenue basis.

Greater navy.

Admission of Arizona and New Mexico as separate states.

Denunciation of Aldrich-Vreeland currency bill and recommendation of emergency currency to be issued by the federal government and loaned to banks under proper guarantee.

Extermination of trusts, enactment of law to prevent duplication of directors among competing corporations, adoption of a license system to protect the public from watered stock, and the prohibition of control by any corporation of more than 50 per cent of the total of any products consumed in the United States.

While the platform pollsters were sitting on the finishing touches, the New York delegation was holding a caucus to determine how it should stand on the presidential and vice-presidential situation. It was conventionally predicted at the meeting that a large majority of the delegation would favor Bryan thus casting the entire vote of the state under the unit rule for the Nebraska. Ex-Senator Charles Towne and Francis Harrison seemed to be the leading candidates for the Empire
