mark of our liberties, and we yield to none in our purpose to maintain their dignity. Our party has given to the bench a long list of distinguished jurists, who have added to the respect and confidence in which this department must be jealously maintained. We resent the attempt of the Republican party to raise a false issue respecting the judiciary. It is an unjust reflection upon a great body of our citizens to assume that they lack respect for the courts. "It is the function of the courts to interpret the laws which the people create, and if the laws appear to work economic, social or political injustice, it is our duty to change them. The only basis upon which the integrity of our courts can stand is that of unswerving justice and realization of life, personal liberty and prosperity. If judicial processes may be abused, we should guard them against abuse.

"Experience has proven the necessity of a modification of the present law relating to injunctions, and we reiterate the pledge of our national platforms of 1896 and 1904 in favor of the measure" which passed the United States senate in 1896 but which a Republican congress has ever since refused to enact, relating to contempt in federal courts and providing for trial by jury in cases of indirect contempt.

"Questions of judicial practice have arisen especially in connection with the industrial disputes. We deem that the parties to all judicial proceedings should be treated with rigid impartiality, and that injunctions should not be issued in any cases in which injunctions would not issue if no industrial dispute were involved."

The following is the railroad plank as adopted by the committee: "We assert the right of congress to exercise complete control over interstate commerce and the right of

each state to exercise just as complete control over commerce within its borders.

"We demand such enlargement of the powers of the interstate commerce commission as may be necessary to enable it to protect persons and places from discrimination and extortion and to compel the railroads to perform their duties as common carriers. We favor the efficient supervision and rate regulation of railroads engaged in interstate commerce.

"To this end we recommend the valuation of railroads by the interstate commerce commission, such valuation to take into consideration the original cost of construction and all elements of value that will render the valuation made fair and just. We favor such legislation as will prohibit the railroads from engaging in business which brings them into competition with their shippers, also legislation which will assure such reduction in transportation rates as conditions will permit, care being taken to avoid reduction that would compel a reduction of wages, prevent adequate services or do injustice to legitimate investments.

"We heartily approve the laws prohibiting the pass and the rebate and we favor any further necessary legislation to restrain, correct and prevent abuses."

Berlin, July 9.—Success of Count Zeppelin's latest airship has led to the organization of a company which proposes to establish a line of airships to carry passengers between Berlin, London, Paris, Vienna, Stockholm, St. Petersburg and Copenhagen.

The new organization has a preliminary capitalization of \$125,000. The organization of the German Aerial Navy league, which is being formed is another result of Zeppelin's success.
