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PEOPLE OF OREGON ARE PROGRESSIVE.

Galveston, Texas, Los Angeles, Cal., Des Moines, Iowa and other cities have adopted the Commission plan of city government. That means that three or five men govern the city just as three or five men govern a county AND DO IT SUCCESSFULLY IN OREGON.

In addition to the commission plan the cities above named and other cities have adopted the "Oregon Idea" of self-government. While we are told the people of Oregon are going crazy over Populism, some of THE ABOVE STRONG REPUBLICAN CITIES HAVE GONE CRAZY TOO.

For instance, Des Moines and Los Angeles are strong Republican cities and are rapidly growing progressive cities.

We copy what follows from A BEAUTIFUL PAMPHLET ADVERTISING THE CITY OF DES MOINES, and commend it to communities making new charters:

The "Des Moines Plan" of municipal government is the most advanced form of government by commission. It has attracted world-wide attention, and its practical application will be watched by men of affairs in every city of Union. Under the "Des Moines Plan" the entire government of the city is vested in a commission of five. One of this number is the mayor, and the entire body constitutes the council. The function of government is divided into five parts, each commissioner being the head of one department. The mayor is the executive of the department of public affairs by virtue of his office. The five departments are named as follows:

1. Department of Public Affairs.
2. Department of Accounts and Finance.

3. Department of Public Safety.
4. Department of Streets and Public Improvements.
5. Department of Parks and Public Property.

The initiative, referendum and recall are combined with government by commission in the "Des Moines Plan." By the initiative, the voter may force the enactment of legislation demanded by a majority of the electorate, even though opposed by the governing body. The referendum makes it possible for the electors to check the unwise expenditure of public funds, the granting of franchises, or the adoption of an ordinance until such action is approved by a majority of the voters. The last provision—the Recall—is the most important of the trio. While the commissioners are elected for a definite term, their tenure of office may be terminated at any time. Thus the governing body is always directly and immediately responsible to the governed.

AUGUST HIGHWAY CONVENTION HELD AT PORTLAND

ANOTHER EFFORT WILL BE MADE TO LAUNCH A MOVEMENT FOR A ROAD LAW THAT WILL BUILD ROADS FOR OREGON.

There is to be a Good Roads movement inaugurated at Portland in August, and the politicians have all got their ears pricked up to catch onto the situation.

Miscellaneous candidates for governor or anything to saddle themselves onto the dear people look favorably on Good Roads as a dandy means of railroading themselves into office.

A Good Roads Program.

A real Good Roads program would mean a great deal to the people of Oregon, and it is high time one were formulated. But it cannot be done by small cheap claptrap political boosters merely copying some long-winded act of the legislature of some other state. That was the fault of the Johnson road law vetoed by the governor. It had closely analyzed the actual conditions in Oregon.

The vital factors in the whole situation have got to be considered by any man who frames an organic good roads act. No other state is situated just like Oregon, and no law merely copied from New York or some other commonwealth will do the business here. That was the trouble with the Tuttle act. It was not assimilated for Oregon conditions, and hence it has proved a failure.

Salem Has Acted.

The Salem Board of Trade has appointed a standing committee to consider streets and roads and make reports, with ex-County Judge Scott at the head of it. He has given good roads a great deal of attention and built some. He has been president of the Good Roads association for some years. He will be able to do a great deal toward securing for this state a workable Good Roads statute, if he enlists practical men to draw up a bill that is adapted to actual conditions in this commonwealth. The time has come to quit theorizing and go to work on a permanent policy that will produce Good Roads by the hundreds of miles. No greater step for the advancement of the state can be taken.

Convention at Portland.

Another effort will be made at Portland to launch a movement that shall produce results. There is no reason why it should not accomplish something if it can get down to business and be stripped of the small-bores who are large-bores in another way. The number of men who want to jump to the front on any plausible occasion is still quite large in all states of the Union.

Good Roads Has the Call.

"Good Roads" seems to have become in recent months the subject of almost every conversation when a group of citizens get together. During the last two weeks there has been more discussion of good roads among members of the Portland Commercial club than there has about the great political campaign that is before us. When dairymen get together they discuss good roads; it is the same with fruit growers, while automobile owners have become veritable cranks on the subject.

An insistent demand, coming from every section of the state, has been made to call some character of representative meeting to discuss a practical plan whereby all Oregon may have better highways.

The dairy interests and the bankers of Portland and other cities and towns of the state are of one mind on the subject. Many of the cities throughout Oregon are building high class hard surface pavements, and everywhere you go you find men talking "Good Roads."

As a result of all this it has been determined to hold an "Oregon Good Roads Conference" in the convention hall of the Portland Commercial club, Tuesday, August 11, with morning, afternoon and evening sessions. No interest in the state seems to be more anxious to have a part in developing the good roads sentiment into a realization than the railroads, and as a result a

An interesting program will be prepared, but there will be no long-winded theoretical speeches—practical men will be secured and practical questions discussed. The Good Roads associations of Oregon and Washington will be asked to co-operate in making the meeting a success. The basis of representation will be announced within a few days, but all commercial and industrial bodies, county judges, county commissioners, editors, and mayors, will be authorized to appoint delegates and urged to have a good representation present.

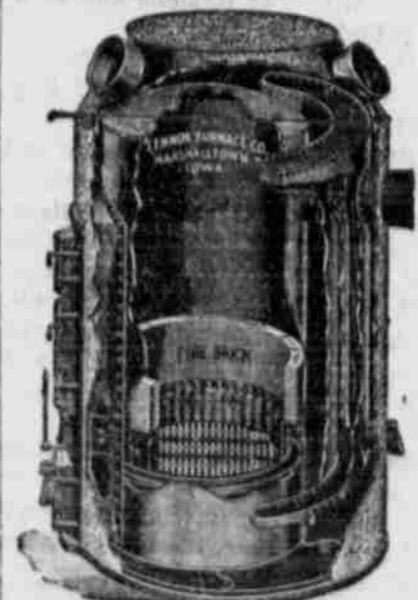
