BIG FLEET IS NEARING HONOLULU

ALL WILL JOIN IN WELCOME—FIREWORKS BY NIGHT AND DAY—JAPS TAKE MUCH INTEREST IN VISIT.

Honolulu, July 15.—The American battleship fleet is expected to arrive here tomorrow morning, according to wireless messages received at the Kuhuku station from the flagship of the approaching armada, and the inhabitants of the islands, regardless of race or condition, have joined enthusiastically in the preparation for the reception, which is expected to surpass any celebration ever seen in Honolulu.

Tomorrow has been declared a holiday and all business will be suspended. Thousands of people will take their places at daylight tomorrow morning on Diamond head to watch for the first glimpse of the white ships over the eastern horizon. A great display of daylight fireworks will greet the ships as soon as they are near enough to make the welcome effective. At nightfall, tomorrow, by the turning of a switch, Honolulu will be transformed into a fair city of light. No such extensive work of this kind was ever attempted here before. The Japanese community raised \$2000 for the entertainment fund.

An interesting feature will be the display of daylight fireworks which will be set off by the lepers at Molokai islands as the ships pass there. One feature of the display will be a big set piece which will spell "Welcome" in large letters of fire.

BALLOON TO START CARNIVAL

BASEBALL, AERONAUT ASCENSION—FUN AND FROLIC WILL REIGN SUPREME IN SALEM. COMPLETE PROGRAM.

With the balloon ascension at 10 o'clock tomorrow will begin the much-heralded and long-awaited event—the Cherry Fair. Three big days of celebration will ensue. It will be a feast of education and of amusement which promises to eclipse anything that has yet been offered in Salem.

The big pavilion where the cherries will be displayed is finished, and the various tents for the carnival are pitched. Cherries are coming in by the wagon load. The overworked committee has held its last meeting. Everything is ready.

The parade will start promptly at two o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Several new features have been entered for the procession since the Fair was postponed. The high school will be represented by a magnificent float, the decorations for which have just been completed by a detail of students.

All the automobiles in town are expected to be in the parade to compete for the handsome electric lamp which has been offered by the Electric Fixture company of Salem. The prizes for the best decorated carriage or buggy have been raised to \$15 and \$10, and many owners of fine turnouts are preparing them for the parade.

RAISING \$100,000 RAILROAD BONDS

FOUR COMMITTEES WENT TO WORK TODAY AT 10 O'CLOCK TO COMPLETE THE JOB AND SECURE THE NEEDED SUBSIDY—GREATEST ENTERPRISE FOR THE CAPITAL CITY YET UNDERTAKEN.

Local committees of rustlers went to work this morning at 10 o'clock raising the bond subscription of \$100,000 to enable A. Welch to build the Salem and Stayton electric railroad—work to begin immediately upon completion of the subscription.

The committees getting the bonds subscribed went to work at Salem, Turner, Aumsville and Stayton simultaneously and by noon had about \$30,000 subscribed. It is expected to raise the fund this week. Daily announcements of progress all along the line will be made.

Business Men's League Act.
At a meeting of the Business Men's league at the Board of Trade rooms last night a committee consisting of J. L. Stockton, chairman, H. W. Meyers, J. F. Hughes, D. J. Fry and F. W. Steusloff were appointed to boost the Salem-Stayton electric line, and the following resolution was adopted by the league: "Whereas, There is a meritorious proposition now on foot to construct

an electric railway between Salem and Stayton, and a proposition is now offered by A. Welch, to construct the same upon the raising of \$100,000 in first mortgage, six per cent, gold bonds, and,
"Whereas, It is expedient that a warm support and hearty cooperation be given the project to insure its early consummation, and
"Whereas, We firmly believe the proposition to be bona fide and worthy of our earnest efforts,
"Therefore, Be it resolved, that it is the sense of this meeting that we, a business men's organization, do hereby endorse the proposition of raising the \$100,000 in bonds, as aforesaid, and that we ask the support of the people of Salem and Stayton and surrounding country towards the early realization of this electric railroad, and authorize the president of this league to appoint a committee of five (5) to assist in the work of raising the amount necessary to float the bonds, and to help along in every way possible."
