

RUSSIANS FAKIRS MIS-REPRESENT CONDITION

(United Press Lined Wire.)
 New York, July 16.—Forty-two Russian secret service agents are on their way to America today, where they will spend several months in a campaign of misrepresentation of conditions in the czar's domains, according to information received by Dr. Paul Kaplan, chairman of the Russian revolutionists in New York.
 Among the spies sent to the United States are 20 brilliant orators who will deliver courses of lectures calculated to deceive the American people into believing conditions in Russia much better than they actually are. Forces have also been sent to the principal countries of Europe where similar steps will be taken.
 Knowledge of the movements of

the Russian secret service agents reached the revolutionists society here through the chief of the Russian spy bureau who recently deserted the service of the czar and joined the rebels. When he abandoned his important post at St. Petersburg he took all his books and records with him and placed them in the hands of his new friends. These will prove invaluable to the rebels as they contain descriptions of every member of the Russian secret police.
 The official who deserted the czar for the rebels knows every member of the secret police, having hired each one personally. While his identity is concealed by Dr. Kaplan, it is understood that his name is known throughout the world.

AMERICAN ATHLETES WINNING GAINING RAPIDLY

WHILE ENGLAND HAS FOUR MEDALS AGAINST U. S. THREE, TURNING POINT HAS COME—WIN DISCUS THROW.

(United Press Lined Wire.)
 London, July 16.—Carrying one gold, silver and bronze medals for first, second and third places in the discus throw and breaking the Olympic record, American athletes today made rapid advancement toward first place in the general results at the Olympic games. Although England holds four gold medals and America but three, the Americans say the Britons were victors in events in which the athletes from the United States had not counted upon taking first places.

English athletes are showing good form and have taken advantage of being on home soil but results of contests thus far indicate that the Americans will make a hard fight to repeat their performance of former Olympic games and carry off first place in the large majority of the events. Members of the American teams have avoided whenever possible entering the events scheduled for the first few days of the meet. They have been sparring for all the time possible in which to become accustomed to the climatic changes here.

Great Britain's wonderful showing yesterday when it captured the gold medal in the 600-yard cycling race and three-mile team race has heartened the home athletes and they entered the field today with new determination to wrest the laurels from the Americans.

When Martin Sheridan, of New York, hurled the discus 134 feet, 2 inches today, winning the finals and breaking his own Olympic record of 122 feet, the American section in the field went wild with joy. As predicted before the games commenced, America made a clean sweep, Griffin taking second place and M. F. Horr, of New York, taking third. Finland had counted upon making a showing in this event, but England expected to take a back seat.

Meredith, of England, established a new Olympic record for the 100-kilometer bicycle race, when he won the second heat in 2 hours, 43 minutes, 15 2-5 seconds.

CASKET FACTORY OPENED

Salem Adds Another Flower to the Ever Growing Wreath of Industries.

A factory has been added to the Capital City factory row on Church street while we slept. A new frame building, two stories, with steam, light, heat and power furnished from the Hansen gas and door works, comprises the establishment known to future fame as the Willamette Manufacturing company, and the first specimen of fine cloth caskets was turned off and now adorns the

Rigdon Undertaking parlors. The president is J. C. Sill, vice-president, C. L. McNary, secretary and treasurer, Jas. W. Wilson. Mr. Sill was for 22 years engaged in the casket trade, and may be considered to understand the business thoroughly from actual experience, traveling for 15 years all over the Pacific Northwest, he knows the wants of the trade, and the art of constructing funeral caskets. The first casket was an octagonal gem in white brocade plush, selling at \$70, a bridal casket, if such a thing could be. Five persons are now employed in the factory, and two families have been brought to Salem, where lumber is cheap, fuel and power at cheap, rents are cheap, and ideal conditions prevail for building up manufactures.

Company Was Formed.
 Without beating drums or calling public meetings the company was formed and \$5000 capital stock

was paid up, and the factory can now turn out from eight to ten caskets per day, but before the year is up hopes to be able to have an output of 30 to 50 per day. Sill had a political experience at Portland that cost him dearly. He ran for public undertaker and coroner of Multnomah county without the consent of the political bosses and the undertakers' trust, and got skinned out of the office and business at the same time. But he learned there was money in the manufacturing business, and he has established himself where he has a wide field. This is proven by the fact that the company has orders ahead to keep them busy for three months, and Sill is happy. The stockholders are happy, and it looks as if this were a fine field for this industry, and The Capital Journal, while not wanting to utilize any of the manufactured product, wishes the new industry all manner of success. There is a

great demand for the product of this factory and Mr. Sill seems to be able to meet the requirements of the market with a first-class article.

DANGEROUS OIL BLAZE HAS BEEN PUT OUT

 Santa Barbara, Cal., July 16.—After 36 hours of fierce battling, the fire fighters have gained the mastery over the flames that destroyed 100,000 barrels of oil at Orcutt, in the Santa Maria oilfields near here.

It is believed today that but two men perished in the fire. Rumors were in circulation last night to the effect that an unknown Mexican also had lost his life while fighting the flames, and that two other men were missing, but these stories are not believed to be true. Several persons were injured, but none it is thought, seriously.
